Ministerial Musings



Like most people of my age, Lotta Hitschmanova was a voice on late night television asking for support for the Unitarian Service Committee. By the time I became an active Unitarian she was retiring from active service after 40 years and the Unitarian Service Committee was becoming the non-denominational USC Canada. So for me, she was mostly a voice in the night.

Except for one remarkable afternoon.

In 1977 I worked for a small Montreal newspaper as a reporter and chief

photographer. My colleague Stef asked me to go along and take some pictures for a feature interview. "Who is it?" I asked. "Lotta Hitschmanova!" "You mean she is still alive?"

Together we met Dr. Lotta in her hotel room. There were no handlers, no assistants. There was just this diminutive 68 year old woman impeccably dressed in her USC uniform. It was supposed to be a 30 minute conversation, but we stayed for two hours completely engaged by her energy, her passion for the cause and her openness. By the end, I don't know how she was faring, but we were worn out. Jessica Purple Rodella, a colleague in southern Ontario recently wrote a sermon for the USC called the "Atomic Mosquito of 56 Sparks Street". That is as good a description of the lady I met as any I have heard.



That day in the hotel room, she told stories that made us laugh and others that made us cry. We have all seen the technique of some Prime Minister or President telling the personal story of some unfortunate and/or heroic citizen to make a (political) point. When Dr. Lotta told us of the women and men she met on USC projects around the world, it was not a device. She was telling us about her friends...or perhaps about children of whom she was justifiably proud. Their problems were her problems. Their joys were her joys. By the end of the two hours these faraway people in faraway places were as real to us as if they had been in the same room.

I won't claim that meeting Dr. Lotta CHANGED MY LIFE. It didn't. But she touched my life in a very subtle way, with her stories, her commitment and her not so subtle suggestion that we really should care about what happened on the other side of our planet.

President's Message



I've been having great fun researching the early history of Edmonton Unitarians in the provincial archives. One thing I've learned: where there are Unitarians, there's food.

Our church today is rich with soup Sundays, potluck suppers, barbecues, and a minister who's a gourmet cook. That food focus is a long tradition. The first official meeting of Unitarians in our city, in April 1912, was in the Blue Moon Tea Room. Refreshments were served after the meeting. That church died in 1938, and in 1951 a group of six

Edmontonians met at the Seven Seas Restaurant to plan a rebirth. When the new Unitarian Church of Edmonton was officially launched in May 1954, the occasion was marked with a dinner – of course!

Now the bad news: Our church remains in very difficult straits financially, as we look for a third tenant. We start getting full rent from our second tenant, now occupying the former NDP space, on Nov. 1 so that will help, but still, it's a very tough year. Our deficit as of Sept. 30, one-quarter into the fiscal year, was \$20,000. PLEASE, everyone, restrain your spending of church dollars. In particular, individual UCE members should not undertake to buy or fix things at church expense, without consulting the appropriate committee chair – or me, if you don't know who to ask.

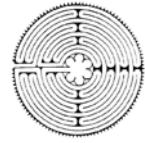

CUC Board Meeting Highlights

From September 23 – 27, 2009 meeting held near Orilla, Ontario

At our recent meeting at a YMCA lodge on Lake Couchiching, Ontario, the Board was delighted to review the many ways in which our new Executive Director, Jennifer Dickson, has hit the ground running:

- Over 300 Canadian UUs have completed her survey seeking input on CUC priorities.

If you haven't yet completed it, the survey is available at:

http://cuc.ca/whats_new/new.htm The end date is October 16.

- Your priorities for programming and staffing will be reflected in options for the budget that she and her staff will prepare for discussion at the December Board teleconference.

- Jenn is continuing her congregational visits across the country, heading out to the west coast in October, and looking forward to meeting our members. Be sure to come out to meet her when she visits a congregation near you!

- In the area of communications, Jenn has begun rethinking how we use tools such as e-lists, the website, and wikis, and is planning for an issue of The Canadian Unitarian by year's end. As well, new Western Region Board member, Rev. Anne Barker, has agreed to take on the role of Communications Liaison for the Board.

- Jenn has also been working with the Board's Social Responsibility Liaison, Jan Greenwood (BC Region), and the chairs of our Social Responsibility Monitoring Groups on new strategies for issuing letters and engaging in social action.

- Recognizing the needs of our youth for supportive regional and national structures, Jenn is taking immediate measures to staff up and rebuild in the wake of UUA changes to continental services and our own staffing deficit.

The re-engagement of youth is a top priority for the Board. Given our concerns, we were pleased to hear from Sean Barron (Youth Observer) that GoldMine, the youth leadership training held for the first time in Canada (in Mississauga, Ontario) this summer, proved to be "an incredible experience" for the attending youth.

The National Identity Task Force will be approaching congregations later in the year regarding the next step in this project that is a major strategic concern to our movement in Canada. Those interested can keep up-to-date with the detailed work of the Task Force at <http://canadianunitarian-council.pbworks.com/Our-National-Identity>.

We were also excited to discuss the possibility of a Canadian "chalice lighters" program ("Northern Lights") with representatives from the UU Ministers of Canada (UUMOC). The ministers also plan to propose a conference stream in adaptive leadership for the 2010 ACM. The planning for the ACM, to be held in Victoria, BC, as well as for our CUC 50th anniversary celebration at the ACM in Toronto in 2011, are both well underway.

CUC President, Calvin Drake, reported that representatives of UU Ministers of Canada (UUMOC) and Canadian Unitarians for Social Justice (CUSJ) have expressed interest in coming together with the CUC Board to consider the potential for developing further our "community of UU communities" in Canada and to explore our respective roles in the stewardship of Canadian UUism. The Board asked Calvin to explore further with these other UU groups, and our youth and other interested groups, how such a

conversation might take place.

This weekend the Board focused on financial and investment policies, potential fundraising strategies, and the monitoring of its newly revised policies. We recognize that more work needs to be done to enable congregations and other UU communities to feel heard nationally and to be involved in national dialogue.
