January 14 "Blanket Exercise" 10:30 - 12:30 p.m.

The Blanket Exercise is an interactive activity which explores the history of Canada and the plight of Indigenous people since the arrival of Europeans to our country. The Blanket Exercise begins with blankets arranged on the floor to represent Canada (Turtle Island) prior to Colonization. Participants, who represent Indigenous peoples, begin by moving around the blankets, trading items. As a narrator reads from a script, gradually their lives change, as more and more Europeans take over their land. Participants respond to cues read from prepared scrolls. By the end only a few Indigenous people remain on the blankets. A meaningful sharing circle completes the Exercise. Please bring blankets. The Exercise will take the place of the usual church service. It will take at least two hours, perhaps a bit longer. Afterwards bannock and preserves, tea and water will be available. Ministerial Musings



I am very much looking forward to the New Year and the two month long theme delving into the lessons of First Nations Spirituality. Since the Truth and Reconciliation Report was released in 2015, the challenge has been to weave the recommendations into the social fabric of this nation. The federal government has to do some things, the provincial governments has to do some things. Great. But the real fact is that more and more First Nations people live in our cities, and particularly here in Edmonton. That means our municipal government has a large role, for this is where services get delivered. And our mayor has said many times "We are all Treaty Six people."

Everyone has a responsibility to uphold their part of the treaty, to work with our neighbours, to learn our history and obligation and to change ourselves and our perspectives when needed.

The TRC report noted,

Reconciliation must become a way of life. It will take many years to repair damaged trust and relationships in Aboriginal communities and between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal peoples. Reconciliation not only requires apologies, reparations, the relearning of Canada's national history, and public commemoration, but also needs real social, political, and economic change. Ongoing public education and dialogue are essential to reconciliation. Governments, churches, educational institutions, and Canadians from all walks of life are responsible for taking action on reconciliation in concrete ways, working collaboratively with Aboriginal peoples. Reconciliation begins with each and every one of us.

These two months of Sundays are intended to be a small step towards reconciliation and constructing the genuinely inclusive and just community we must become.

We devoted the month of October, 2015 to the topic, but if this work is to truly bring the change we seek, we must keep going back. We have to keep looking at ourselves, our possibilities and, for these eight weeks, at the gifts we gain from studying the First Nations traditions.

Four services will explore the Seven Sacred Teachings. There will be a Sunday given over to a two hour moving and educational Blanket Exercise, two musical services from Chorealis and one more service devoted to...we the details for that February service aren't guite fixed yet.

Hope we see you all in church for one or more of these!

The Travelling Chalice Kit!



Each week we light a chalice in church, but few of us do it at home, even for special events. The Travelling Chalice is a new idea for us where families (of one or more) can borrow our kit for a week and explore what the chalice means to them. We will have a sign-up sheet on the credenza so you can book it ahead, or if no one has taken it, note that you have it and it's your for a week.

What's involved? Inside the box you will find a chalice and wax or electric candle (your choice), a lovely traditional Transylvanian Unitarian cloth, a book of meditations, a book with some longer essays on our Principles and a blank journal. You may want to use the chalice during meals or at bedtime or in the morning. You can choose a

reading in the kit or devise something of your own. There are no rules.

In the journal we would encourage you to record how you used the chalice, perhaps write down a reading you found or simply add it to the box. You can sign your entry or not. And if you are one of the first users, you will find a couple of entries as the staff has been taking it out for a test drive. Enjoy!



Update on UCE's Casual Renters

A review of our casual renter policies and rates was initiated by the Board to ensure that the rates and policies for casual renters were appropriate. Without rental income the UCE would not be able to supports its current level of staffing and services. The rates for casual renters were in many cases well below rates of other churches and community facilities. The review, also, identified that maintaining the UCE's charitable status requires compliance with Canadian Revenue Agency's requirement that:

A charity can lease property to another registered charity below market value. However, if the charity leases property to a non-charity tenant, it must lease the property at fair market value.



This means that UCE members cannot be given a lower rate for their private events at our church.

Church Administrator Janet Polkovsky is the key contact for casual renters, and prospective renters work through her. Where required, she receives advice from a Casual Renters Advisory Committee comprised of Mike Keast (chair), Larry Charach and Susan Ruttan. Janet has done a stellar job in maintaining excellent relations with the UCE's renters while ensuring our facilities are first available for UCE requirements to meet the needs of its members and friends.

The Board accepted the report's recommendations and established the Casual Rental Committee. As a result, a new Rate Schedule has been created for casual renters which will ensure that the UCE receives fair value for use of its casual rental space. This rate chart will appear on the new enhanced rental section on the UCE website (forthcoming).

To learn more about all this, feel free to have a discussion with any member of the Casual Renters Committee.

Sound Tech Team

You need not think of yourself as a techie--many past and current techs will agree. Ut's mostly about attention to detail.

We'll start emailing you the monthly schedule so you can connect, at your convenience, with current team members before their assigned Sunday. On the Sunday, you'll meet them about 9:30-9:45 at the church. They will train you very gently at your own pace. You'll start by shadowing one or more tech on one or more of their Sundays. When you feel ready, you'll take over doing

the setup, sound board operation during the service, and take-down after, with that Sunday's tech coaching you as needed. You can continue to train for as many Sundays as you like. (And of course, you can opt out any time if you decide being a tech isn't for you.)

Once you feel ready, you can go solo:

Towards the end of each month, I email team members to find out which Sundays of the next month they can and want to be available. (If you expect to be too busy, it's entirely okay to ask to sit out a month.) Once they've all replied, I match members' availability with Sundays and email the schedule to the whole team, also cc'ing Brian, Janet, and Karen & Gordon for Chorealis.

NATIONAL CAMPAIGN

Our national Unitarian organization, the Canadian Unitarian Council, is making a special pitch for your support. It needs money for two important initiatives: building a new CUC website, and continuing the Truth, Healing and Reconciliation (THR) project.

The CUC's national website is being rebuilt to make it more responsive and accessible to newcomers, leaders and UUs looking for resources and information.
