A Very Generous Gift



Jane Parkinson had put a bequest for our church in her will, but recently she decided on a more fun way to thank us – send a generous cheque right now. It's the biggest single donation the Unitarian Church of Edmonton has had in many years.

Jane was a UCE member from the late 1970s until 2004, when her career as a law librarian caused her to move to Calgary. She's still in Calgary, now retired.

"The church was very helpful to me through some very difficult times in my life," Jane says, explaining why she has been so generous to UCE.

Our church was also a very special place for her son Ted Cunningham, who died of a sudden heart attack in 2010 at age 34. As a youth he was active in the UCE youth group, especially loving the sleepovers in the sanctuary. He took part in OWL training as well.

Jane remembers young Ted calling her from school one day, saying he was trying to write an essay about Unitarianism and was struggling to define it. His mom gave him her short definition: Freedom, reason and tolerance.

Health problems make it unlikely Jane will be able to visit our congregation again. We will hold you in our hearts, Jane.



Tenth Annual Genocide Memorial



The Tenth Annual Genocide Memorial was held on Sunday, July 15, at our church. The Memorial provides members of all ethnic groups and faiths an opportunity to reflect on planned violence aimed at the mass extinction of helpless men, women, and children as a function of war, ethnic cleansing, slavery, colonial appropriation of people and their lands, greed, gender bias, neglect, or political oppression. The program included poems, reflections, prayers, readings, and superb music provided by Gordon Ritchie, Erin Vandermolen-Pater, and the Soul Singers. In keeping with tradition, stones

were placed in memory and witness. The ceremony, in turns solemn and upbeat, was followed by a delightful potluck and conversations in Keeler Hall.

This event, held for the first time in our church, was organized by Audrey Brooks and supported by Kimberly Lang, members of the Social Justice Working Group, and many others. Over 100 people attended, including dozens who have never been to our church before. Holding the annual Genocide Memorial at the church highlights the role of our church in our larger community. It also represents a public and meaningful action in support of two key principles: the inherent worth and dignity of every person; and justice, equity, and compassion in human relations.

CONGREGATIONAL COMPANIONS

Unitarians reject dogma and rituals that are restrictive and limiting. But some of the more traditional religious practices have their use. Take prayer, as an example. What if we could take the idea of prayer and remove all of the "problem stuff"? No beseeching or bargaining, no begging for grace or apologizing for sin. What might we be left with? Is there any part worth trying to save? Could the practice have meaning for us, especially those suffering emotional and spiritual pain? I believe it can. And that the effort will be rewarding and enriching for those who choose to participate.



We don't really have a role for a kind of 'chaplain' who could help with that in our church. Which makes sense, given that many of our congregants reject the traditional ideas of God and the practices that go along with those ideas. But I wondered, how could we modify this practice and the role to make it meaningful and relevant to our congregants today?

Our starting point on this journey is a name change. Both terms, prayer and chaplain, carry baggage. We need better terms that suit us. We have come up with Congregational Companions.

A Congregational Companion will serve as a support person for their fellow congregants. To actively, deeply listen to them, hold space for them, be empathetic to their issues and concerns. They will not be therapists. They will not be ministers. They will be companions, sharing their fellow congregants' journey...

If you are interested in participating in this program there will be training this fall starting in October. Feedback as to a preference for a weekend intensive vs a recurring evening class would be appreciated. Please speak with Erica De Neve (edeneve@shaw.ca) or Brian for more details.

CUC Press Release

The Canadian Unitarian Council released a press statement August 29, 2018 offering a comprehensive sex ed program in response to Ontario's decision to repeal the 2015 Health and Sex Education curriculum. "The Canadian Unitarian Council (CUC) advocates for fact-based sexuality

education, which is provided in many Unitarian congregations through its progressive Our Whole Lives (OWL) program.

The CUC believes that the Ontario government's decision to repeal the comprehensive 2015 Health and Sex Education curriculum and reinstate the curriculum from 1998 will leave children at risk and adversely impact schools' ability to create cultures of inclusion, safety and consent. Neither does it prepare students of all genders and sexual orientations to develop healthy,

Westwood Unitarian Happenings Breath & Voice with David Wilson






Westwood Unitarian FreeThinkers' Book Club

Around Our Church (Updated)

If you see a non-emergency problem, i.e. something that is broken or a spill not cleaned up, please follow these guidelines (if you are able):

- 1. Photograph the issue and email it to the Office Administrator: <u>chadmin@uce.ca</u> including the date and time you first noticed or call the Office and leave a message if I'm not able to answer.
- 2. If it's a hazard for falling or other injury, please do your best to clean it safely (there are cleaning supplies under the sinks and coffee nook cupboards and in the unlocked Caretaker's Room (in the back hallway).
- 3. If it's something that will stain (i.e. marker scribbles on table), your early attempt to clean it may prevent it from being more difficult to remove later.
- 4. If it's broken, please ensure that it will not get damaged further or cause injury to anyone and notify the Administrator. Thank you for your vigilance!
- 5. Lastly, if you would like to make or suggest a change to the building or floor plan, please check first with the Administrator or our Property Maintenance Committee (see contact list on last page).

• UCE is a scent-free zone. We have members, some of them small children, with severe allergies. So avoid wearing any scents when you come to gatherings at the church – colognes, hair spray, etc. Also please remember when cleaning church property (tablecloths, counter tops, dishes, etc.) to use scent-free products.

• **Brunch:** Going for brunch after church is a UCE tradition. Want to join? Contact Marge Roche or Jennifer Hinchcliffe at church.

• **Recycling:** We don't have recycling pickup at the church, so we need help with taking blue bags home for home collection or to the Recycle Centre. The bags are in the kitchen and/or social hall

• Walls: Please do not use scotch tape on a painted wall. If you need a sign printed and posted in the church please contact the office, <u>chadmin@uce.ca</u>.

• **Pop Cans:** We raise money from returnable bottles, tetra packs etc. donated by members. Drop your contribution in the second storage room (the single door) in Keeler Hall.

• Food: If you use our kitchen, clean it up afterward and don't leave any food behind. Public Health Regulations prohibit the storing of perishable food for more than one day

• Security: If your committee or groups are meeting after Church hours, please make sure all the exit doors are locked before setting the alarm and leaving. The exits that need to be checked are Keeler Hall and the side door (on the same as the main doors, by the picnic table).

A Request from the Church Office

Please be mindful of the following when you come into the church office with requests: I am very happy to see you and to help you. However I ask that you please consider that I am often in the middle of something when you come in. This could include working with numbers, editing or doing other tasks that require my focused attention. When you come into the office, please check in with first and let me know that you have a request. Then give me a few minutes to complete what I am doing or to reorient my attention to you. Something simple like "Hi Janet, I need some help with something, do you have a minute?" would be great. I don't need long to give you my attention but I do need a few minutes to transition my focus to you in a clear and present manner.
