MINISTERIAL MUSINGS

This column is about stuff we don't always notice or remember to appreciate. Specifically I am thinking about things that get done behind our backs. A lot of that kind of work goes on around our church. In January we were asked on short notice to hold a memorial service for Joanne Olafson, a longtime member. When I added a request for volunteer help to the service announcement letter, about six people replied quickly and about a dozen showed up to help with set up, coffee, serving and cleaning up. Just like that!



And while it's true that we sometimes have trouble recruiting regular volunteers (as in the RE program), we also have a lot of folks who just do stuff. On Wednesdays a gang of mostly older guys come in to fix things, things I often didn't even know needed fixing. They make a list with the help of Mike Keast, but they add a lot of little things themselves. They also help unload the Food Bank truck when it comes. We don't have to organize them or remind them...we just have to say thanks.

Another often unnoticed area is communication. Few of us realize how much work it takes to keep the web site up to date, to manage our social media pages ensuring there is good regular and fresh content (including pestering the minister to provide some of that content), collecting and editing our newsletter, recording and publishing our services online. Short answer: It's a lot of work!

How about the kitchen? With more people renting and using our kitchen, it needs regular cleaning that goes beyond the scope of our building maintenance contract. Again some dedicated folk just go ahead and do it, making sure our kitchen is well regarded by the health inspector.

I could go on and on noting the work of the tellers, the sound techs, the RE teachers, the gardeners, the aesthetics folks, the clean-up and prep crews for our various celebrations, the folks who return bottles and empty donation bins. My point is that this community exists because the members take care of it. If our community is vibrant it's because you make this happen. Sure, the elected Board manages things, and the staff all make their contributions, but without that ad hoc volunteer help we would be nowhere.

So thank you, nameless ones. Those of us who are paid to work here, know who most of you are and appreciate what you do.

On January 12th I was pleased to attend the event where we celebrated the retirement of UCE's debts. We have now paid for our church building and that's a great feeling.

There were a lot of people that supported our journey to this new building. Our members and friends contributed over \$600,000 to our building fund when that call was made over 15 years ago. The Brews family that sold us the building were especially generous, selling us this building for \$300,000 less than market value, and then letting us pay over a period of years to match our building fund donations. At the end of construction, the remaining debt was sold to our members as debentures. Then our members and friends paid for those debentures by volunteering for casinos. This fall the last debenture was paid back. Along the way there has been lots of additional support; the anonymous donation that built the new kitchen, the debenture holders who donated their earned interest or even their entire debentures back to the church, the donation for our sound system, and the additional fundraising for completing the library, Keeler Hall, the labyrinth floor, and the donations to the endowment fund that have brought it back to nearly were it was before being spent on the construction. What a journey it has been! Thank you!

But our building is not our church. It is more than that. Our journey includes the people and activities and services and events that bring us all together. During the past 15 years while we have been paying for this building we have continued to support the work of the church through our annual canvass. In each of those 15 years we still raised the ~\$180,000 needed to support our staff and the programs of our church. With the final payment for the building we can now divert that funding (casino funding mostly) to other needs. The board is asking us what our next needs and wants will be and will be asking for everyone's input in the next few months.

That brings us back to canvass again! Your donations are still needed to support the journey of this church. We may end up with a bit more funding to fix a leaky roof or buy new chairs, but we still need your canvass contributions to support our staff and programs. I look forward to your continued support!

Canvass is our annual call for support to the members and friends of this church. We ask that everyone submit a pledge by the end of March so that we can plan UCE's journey for the next year. 


CHURCH EVENTS

Please feel free to arrive anytime between 7 and 8:30; each individual will have an opportunity go through the Labyrinth and complete the personal work of their choice. You can expect to take about 30 minutes to go through the entire process, and you are welcome to stay for tea and discussion once you're done!

This is a meditative walk that is best suited to those who are comfortable and respectful of quiet contemplation – often age 12 and older.

FEBRUARY THEME:

"WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE PEOPLE WHO CONFRONT RACISM?"

February is Black History Month, the precursor to Black History Month was created in 1926 in the USA, when historian Carter G. Woodson and the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History announced the second week of February to be "Negro History Week". This week was chosen because it coincided with the birthday of Abraham Lincoln on Feb. 12 and of Frederick Douglass on Feb. 14, both of which dates black communities had celebrated together since the late 19th century.

Even though February is Black History Month, many consider Martin Luther King Day (January 21, 2019) the beginning of Black History Month. Did you know that Dr. Martin Luther King. Jr. delivered his speech "Don't Sleep Through the Revolution" at the Unitarian Universalist Association General Assembly May 18, 1966? Click here to read it on the UUA web site.

In Dr. King's speech, you will see mention of Unitarians Rev. James Reeb and Mrs. Viola Liuzzo, who answered the Call to Selma and Jimmie Lee Jackson – all of whom lost their lives in Alabama fighting for human rights.



Jimmie Lee Jackson (December 16, 1938 – February 26, 1965) was an African American civil rights activist in Marion, Alabama and a deacon in the Baptist church. On February 18, 1965, while participating in a peaceful voting rights march in his city, he was beaten and shot by Alabama State Troopers. Jackson was unarmed and died eight days later in the hospital.

His death was part of the inspiration for the Selma to Montgomery marches in March 1965, a major event in the Civil Rights Movement that helped gain Congressional passage of the Voting Rights Act of 1965.

Rev. James Reeb (January 1, 1927 – March 11, 1965) was with thousands who gathered on March 9, 1965 to march but were turned back at the Edmund Pettis Bridge. That night, Reeb and two other Unitarian Universalist ministers, Orloff Miller and Clark Olsen, left a diner on foot. The three headed, side by side, to the chapel where Dr. King was to speak. On the way to the chapel, the three ministers were assaulted by four or five white men. On March 11, two days after his arrival in Selma, James Reeb died. His death so shocked the country and the U.S. Congress that President Johnson sent the Voting Rights Act to



Congress within days. Dr. King, invited to Washington to support the Voting Rights Act, declined. Instead, he delivered the eulogy at Reeb's funeral.

Viola Gregg Liuzzo (April 11, 1925 – March 25, 1965) was a UU layperson and mother of five children from Detroit. Passionate about racial justice issues, she traveled to Selma to participate in the marches of 1965. While transporting marchers in her car, she was shot and killed by members of the Ku Klux Klan.

Today, she is remembered as a martyr for the civil rights movement, and is honored along with Jimmie Lee Jackson and Rev. James Reeb on the Selma Memorial plaque at UUA headquarters.

UCE GLOW GETTERS!



Hi there! The GlowGetters are a small group of volunteers working to upgrade the energy efficiency of UCE (Andrew Mills, Karen Bilida, Scott Harrison, and Mike Keast). The church spends nearly \$30,000 a year on utilities so we are *Glowing* to get that reduced! We started by applying for the Business, Non-profit, and Institutional Energy Savings Program. This program paid for an energy audit of the church (including our leased spaces in the front of the building). That audit was completed before the holidays and laid out a

series of energy saving strategies that the church could take to reduce our energy use. They identified 15 things we could do to save energy. The GlowGetters are reviewing these identified items and will make

recommendations to the board so that they can choose whether to include some upgrades in next year's church budget.

Completing the audit also qualified the church for the Non-profit Energy Efficiency Transition (NEET) program. This week a contractor came to assess the church for that program, and we qualify for funding for some upgrades. The most significant upgrades will be to our lighting. The contractor found over 400 fluorescent tubes that they will upgrade to LED lights free of charge. This doesn't quite do all the lighting but it will go a long way to completing the lighting upgrades recommended by the energy audit. As I write this, we have just heard from the contractor that they will start installing these new lights as soon as next week!

SHARING OUR ABUNDANCE



The Unitarian Church of Edmonton donates half of the loose change collected each month to a different charity. For the month of February UCE will be sharing with iHuman Youth Society, Edmonton. iHuman supports youth to obtain housing, get mental health and addictions support and build on their creative strengths. Their mission is to work with traumatized and marginalized youth who live high risk lifestyles.

UCE HAS A MINISTERIAL RELATIONS COMMITTEE

What is a Ministerial Relations Committee (MRC)? Why do we have one?

This committee's role is to make sure the relationship between the minister and the congregation is a healthy one. An MRC receives and/or gathers information by survey or questionnaire in order to prepare a report for the organization at year end. The MRC does not exist because there are problems. Our current focus is on exploring the general health of the whole. This year we would like to know how the membership sees the totality. Our mandate is to collect that information as a basis for making recommendations on how we could improve and maintain healthy relationships as we move into a time of change.

What does that mean to me? Who can I talk to if I have questions?

It means that your feeling and experiences about ministry in UCE aren't just declared to be 'important'. The work of the committee is to make sure there is an avenue for those feelings and experiences to be expressed and make a real impact on how things are going in the relationships between the different parts of the UCE community.

The Canadian Unitarian Council (CUC) is the national organization for UUs in Canada. The CUC is made up of member congregations to which it is accountable. It provides support for UUs and congregations across the country, fostering growth and outreach, particularly in the areas of lifespan religious education, spiritual growth, and social responsibility.

This year's AGM is in Toronto on May 11, 2019 from 11:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. UCE is entitled to have four delegates, who may attend in person (at their own cost) or online. Delegates are authorized to vote on the board of trustees and the motions discussed at the meeting.

Delegates should be willing to become familiar with proposed resolutions for the CUC AGM, other matters pertaining to the AGM, and <u>Annual Meeting Rules of Procedure</u>. They should also be willing to report back to the congregation on the AGM.

There is an online orientation session and an email group to support delegates.

Delegates must be selected and registered by April 1.


Chorus 2019
