MINISTERIAL MUSINGS



Belonging.

When I was a young minister, I was schooled by older colleagues about belonging to the community of ministry. They were direct and to the point: "If there is a collegial gathering, GO! Ordination, installation, chapter meeting? Those are the first things you put in your calendar."

It was an interesting idea. There was no question of whether or not we belonged, or should attend, or had the luxury of waiting for a personal invitation. Rather, it was an implied obligation. Because I had joined that community, I was expected to participate. Period, full stop.

We Unitarians who meet in congregations are a lot more lax than that. No one insists that people must come to church every Sunday (nor would I like to see that change). No one orders us to volunteer for a committee or task. And while we ask people to pledge for the coming year in our annual Canvass, no one shows up at your door demanding payment. Ours is a free religion, so it goes against our nature to demand much of anything from our members.

Except we ask those who choose to join our congregation to think about what it means for them to belong.

To me, it means showing up. I had that drummed into me. And I found that the more I showed up, the stronger my connection to colleagues became. If you want to be part of this community, then step up and be part of it.

Belonging means choosing to actively work on your faith, your spiritual direction, your ethical values. Belonging means committing to keep growing in yourself.

Belonging also means participating in the community. If we don't choose to step inside, once we feel safe, then we may not ever develop a real sense of belonging to a community. It can be a big step. It can feel risky. But with risk can come some reward.

Decide if you want to belong. It's really even more important than formally joining.

Come to service when you can, come to social events, help out, step into leadership roles you think might suit your talents and abilities. You don't need to wait to be asked. Right now our Leadership Team is recruiting some people to serve on a few key committees. Find out about them. Would you fit? Would that kind of volunteerism suit you? If not, is there something else that would seem right? One of the best ways to become more a part of the community is to share tasks with others. They can be small or large, it doesn't matter. When you say, "I can do that!" then you are stepping more into the circle. It's the best way to get to know them and to build ties. Not everyone can volunteer at this time in their lives, but most people can help out a little now and then. It's a step towards belonging.

Maybe I was lucky. I was pretty much ordered to act like I belonged to the community of ministers. In my case, 'acting like it' made it real. I have never regretted my decision to step into the circle and claim my belonging.

Leadership Committee Seeks Committed and Engaged Candidates!

Our UU Principles call us to affirm and promote the right of conscience and the use of democratic process within our congregations and in society at large. Each year our Annual General Meeting (AGM) provides us with the opportunity to act on that principle as the congregation elects candidates for the Board, the Ministerial Relations Committee and the Leadership Committee (formerly known as the Nominating Committee). Our Bylaws require all candidates to be members of the Congregation.

The Board of Trustees is responsible for managing the property of the Church, the conduct and administration of its business and general supervisions of the programs and activities of the Church. Each year, we elect a President and a Vice-President to serve a one year term each, and two Trustees to serve a two-year term each. We also elect a Secretary or a Treasurer in alternate years, and each of these officers serves a two-year term. A member of the Board may serve a variety of positions but only for six consecutive years.

The Ministerial Relations Committee acts as liaison between the Minister and the congregation and provides insight to the Minister regarding the life of the Church and how it is functioning. This committee consists of four members elected by the congregation, and a fifth member named by the Minister. Two members of this committee are elected at each AGM to serve a two-year term.

The Leadership Committee is responsible for presenting to each AGM a list of eligible candidates willing to stand for election to vacancies on the Board of Trustees, the Ministerial Relations Committee and the Leadership Committee. In 2017, bylaw changes added facilitating the training, election and succession of Church leaders to the duties of the committee. This committee consists of four members. Two members are elected at each AGM to serve a two-year term. We currently have a vacancy on the committee, and will be seeking a candidate to serve the remaining year of the vacant term.

At the 2018 AGM the Treasurer will be elected for a two-year term and we have already confirmed a candidate for that position. We also have one candidate for Trustee and one candidate for the Ministerial Relations Committee.

Delegates wanted for CUC AGM

The CUC is the national organization for UUs in Canada. The CUC is made up of member congregations to which it is accountable. It provides support for UUs and congregations across the country, fostering growth and outreach, particularly in the areas of lifespan religious education, spiritual growth, and social responsibility.

This year's AGM is in Toronto on May 11, 2019 from 11:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. UCE is entitled to have four delegates, who may attend in person (at their own cost) or online. Delegates are authorized to vote on the board of trustees and the <u>motions</u> discussed at the meeting.

Delegates should be willing to become familiar with proposed resolutions for the CUC AGM, other matters pertaining to the AGM, and <u>Annual Meeting Rules of Procedure</u>. They should also be willing to report back to the congregation on the AGM.

There is an online orientation session and an email group to support delegates. Delegates must be selected and registered by April 1.

Historical Timeline of the UCE

Here, in brief, are the highlights from the first century of the Unitarian Church in Edmonton...

~ Early 1900s ~

1912

A Unitarian Church is launched in Edmonton, with the help of Rev. A.J. Pineo and support from Unitarian headquarters in Boston. The first service is April 21, 1912 at the Blue Moon Tea House. In an announcement sent to the Edmonton Journal, Pineo says: "It is a church that stands for freedom in truth-seeking and maintains that religion should be as progressive as human thought." Initially called the First Liberal Church of Edmonton, the name is changed within months to First Unitarian Church of Edmonton. Pineo quits as minister in 1913. Prof. W.H. Alexander becomes the leading lay member of the church.

As people share links to resources we will add them to our resource site, which we hope will further facilitate connections between faith groups, communities and organizations across the country. Do you know specialty groups or organizations dealing with specific water issues? Please invite them to join the Facebook group as well as their input is invaluable.

As the National Social Justice Team, we are committed to walking this journey with you and look forward to seeing what ripples of change we can create together! <u>Join the Ripple Effect!</u>
