Personally it's been an interesting year as my relationship with Erica Slevin has blossomed into an engagement. The blending of families that has gone far better than we had any right to expect. We share four great children.

I completed my nine years of service to the ICUU and six years with Capital Region Housing and stepped away from both. There have been a few health issues over the winter, but they are behind me now and I am looking forward to my fund-raising bicycle events in June and August.

National CUC News

Lois Hole (1929-2005), Alberta's lieutenant-governor, Author, Businesswoman, Horticulturalist, Educator

Named lieutenant-governor in February, 2000, Hole was well known for her philanthropy, and her support for literacy.

A gardening enthusiast, Hole, along with her husband, ran one of Western Canada's largest retail gardening stores. The author of many gardening books, Hole was a regular contributor to a number of newspapers, including the Globe and Mail, Edmonton Journal and Edmonton Sun. She also made a number of appearances on CBC TV's Canadian Gardener. She was famous for the hugs she offered to almost everyone she met. Lois became well known for her community work.

The Rev. Brian Kiely, Minister of the Unitarian Church of Edmonton, of which she was a member, wrote "Through the years, Lois was a tireless advocate for many liberal causes. If she saw something as unjust, she was the person who went out and tried to do something

about it." Her Unitarian principles inform much of her life and causes.
