October 29 "Engaging in Democracy" Rev. Brian J. Kiely


A more spiritually focused service to close out this theme. What does it mean to engage in democracy, to truly celebrate the democratic principle - win or lose?

"The Death of Sunday School"

This provocatively titled essay has been causing a buzz throughout the UU universe and was the topic of the meeting between Lauren and I and the Westwood professional staff. We have also discussed this with the Board and the RE Committee.



In our discussions with the Westwood staff we developed an idea where we would keep the children through the majority of the service including the main program piece (sermon) and then go to shorter class sessions during the meditation, closing, announcements and coffee hour.

In recent years we have been doing more post service adult programming - Soup Sundays, Social Justice Q and A sessions with guest speakers, some adult programs Brian leads, congregational meetings (formal and informal) and so on. Typically we have offered childcare during those sessions, but in this new model, the children simply could be at class (with snacks and playtime too!)

We would like to try this during the month of November. We are already planning a four session adult program on "Living and Dying" following the service, so parents could choose coffee hour or attend the course while their children are in session.

What would it look like?

Have the children in the service with their families for about 40 minutes including a story for all ages, the usual Sunday rituals and the sermon.

We would have a table supervised by our RE staff. It would have art and sensory items to help children deal with boredom. Already the adult version of the table in front of the quiet room/nursery is getting regular use. These activities tables are a recognition that not all people listen or concentrate in the same way.

Following the sermon the children go off to then go off to class. Meanwhile the adults complete the service (meditation, closing, announcements) go into coffee hour. Some may attend the Living and Dying Program.

November 26 Assisted Dying, Brian Kiely. Brian will update the status on Assisted Dying status in Alberta and look at where legislation may go next. We can discuss the philosophical questions and the steps facing anyone contemplating this avenue.


Edmonton UU Literary Reading Club

Habitat for Humanity: Summer 2017

Members of the Unitarian Church of Edmonton joined members of the Capital Region Interfaith Housing Initiative to volunteer in helping to build affordable housing on site at Carter Place, 2216- 24 Street in the Mill Creek area of Edmonton. Some UCE members worked at the prefab shop, making walls used in building houses for 58 families who work 500 hours on the homes as their down payment. They then purchase the home from Habitat with an interest-free mortgage, that is never more than 25 % of their income.

Carter Place is named in honour of former U.S. President Jimmy Carter, who, with his wife, Rosalyn, came to be part of the launch of the project. Habitat for Humanity celebrated its 34th anniversary, and decided that for Canada's 150th, Habitat Canada would have its biggest ever building projects, 74 homes in total.

Truth, Healing, and Reconciliation Facilitator Training

Are you interested in becoming a facilitator for the CUC Truth, Healing, and Reconciliation Reflection Guides? The next Facilitator Trainings will be held via Zoom video-conference on the following dates:

-Saturday, September 30 from 9 a.m. -12 p.m. Pacific, 12 - 3 p.m. Eastern Saturday, November 4 from 9 a.m. -12 p.m. Pacific, 12 - 3 p.m. Eastern

Please take special note about the facilitation training and its requirements. We approach this work knowing that we are all learning how to walk the path of reconciliation – in short, none of us are experts. We know that true reconciliation comes from the creation of safe space in order to engage in authentic dialogue. The materials used in the Reflection Guides are complex and the activities and group facilitation requires skill. This topic is sensitive in nature and facilitators need to be able to respond to sensitive group dynamics and responses to the material being provided.

For that purpose, we require facilitators to have a basic understanding of our approach to this work.

Congregational approval and a \$25 participation fee will be required to register for the training. Congregational support means that your minister or religious educator knows that you have signed up for the facilitation training and are in agreement that you'd make a good facilitator in this area.



Famous UU's

While there is much controversy over who in history has been claimed as Unitarian, it is none the less interesting to see the connections and evolution of Unitarianism Universalism.





Although Alexander Graham Bell is most often associated with the invention of the telephone, his interests were extremely varied. According to one of his biographers, Charlotte Gray, Bell's work ranged "unfettered across the scientific landscape" and he often went to bed voraciously reading the Encyclopædia Britannica, scouring it for new areas of interest.

The range of Bell's inventive genius is represented only in part by the 18 patents granted in his name alone and the 12 he shared with his collaborators. These included 14 for the telephone and telegraph, four for the photophone, one for the phonograph, five for aerial vehicles, four for "hydroairplanes", and two for selenium cells. Bell's inventions spanned a wide range of interests and included a metal jacket to assist in breathing, the audiometer to detect minor hearing problems, a device to locate icebergs, investigations on how to separate salt from seawater, and work on finding alternative fuels.
