Ministerial Musings

What does it mean to be a Unitarian Universalist? What does it mean to be part of UCE?

Well, those questions are likely to be answered differently by each person who claims the titles.

Many of us arrive at this church for the first time a little wary of religious stereotypes we have encountered. We wonder if we will fit in with the people we meet. We wonder if we will like what we hear in the services. We wonder if the theology will make us feel confined or uncomfortable. For some, coming to church is about crossing off the reasons why we might not want to come back. We start by dealing with negatives.



Not surprisingly those who do come back feel a measure of relief with the answers they find to all of the above questions. Because many of us start with those concerns, when someone asks us what Unitarians are, we often begin with, "Well they are NOT..." You can fill in the blank for yourself.

That was how I first answered the questions when I started attending a long time ago. Sometimes and in certain situations I still find myself saying, "Well, we are not that!!!" It's usually a response to someone trying to stick me and my church in a pigeonhole of their own design.

Over the last months the Board has been discussing a book called "Fishing Tips". It's an account of how a United Church congregation in Calgary changed their point of view and their activities and grew in astonishing ways. One of the steps they took was to become clearer on who they are and how they carry out their mission. It's a lesson we might all find useful. In the weeks ahead we encourage conversations about who we are as Unitarians. Maybe we can move away from "They are not" to "We are!" spoken with enthusiasm and ownership.

On my street with 22 houses only two are having a newspaper delivered. Now that makes me feel old! So where are people getting their trusted information these days? Where do they go to verify what they've just read on Wikipedia? Where do they go to get their truth?

Our church is a place where you can explore truth. In community we bring the stories and news of our days together for discussion. We look at the mythology of gods, goddesses, and demi-gods and choose what we will take away as truth. So I ask you to support your church. The Right to a Healthy Environment?

The Social Justice Working Group plans to support an initiative that would enshrine the right to a healthy environment in the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms. "Support," in this case, would mean sending a letter to City Council to encourage them to take the actions necessary to proclaim Edmonton's support for this initiative. According to the Blue Dot Campaign, over 160 municipalities have already declared their support and 110 countries have included this right in their constitution. Honour Our UCE Members

Rules:

- Nominations must be made in writing by UCE members and must include reasons for nominating the person or persons.
- Members of the board may not submit nominations.
- Staff members and current members of the board are not eligible.
- Past staff members and members of the board are eligible if the services for which they are recommended were not performed during the period when they held these special positions.
- A person may be nominated for, or win, the award more than once.

CUC Award: Call for Nominations for Knight Award

At the CUC's Annual Conference and Meeting in Hamilton, Ontario next May, the Knight Award will be presented to a living person who has, as a volunteer, contributed at the national level to furthering the principles of Unitarianism in Canada. The award honours the ideals exemplified by the lives and work of Victor and Nancy Knight.

Nominations may be submitted by any member or friend of a Canadian UU congregation, and must be accompanied by a citation describing what the nominee has done at the national level to promote liberal religious principles in Canada and why she or he should be considered for the award. Nominations must be received by April 1st, 2018."



For many of us the verdict in the Colten Boushie case shook us to our core – others are outraged, enraged, even fearful. The verdict is a step back in the journey towards reconciliation – a big step backward.

In 2014, Canadian Unitarians, through our Expression of Reconciliation pledged to be in solidarity with our Indigenous siblings in spirit, and we committed to the journey of healing and reconciliation between Indigenous and Non-Indigenous people.

Our thoughts are with the family of Colten Boushie and with Indigenous people across Canada who have lived through situations like this countless times. We acknowledge we are only just beginning to feel the deep grief that comes with the work of reconciliation.

As we do with anyone in our community that is grieving, let us turn our attention to those who need us now - our Indigenous siblings in spirit. As Canadian Unitarians, let them hear from us that we know they are not alone.

Let us reach out to our local communities and offer our deep condolences for what they must be going through.

Let us bring food, send cards, show up at local events being organized.

Let us reach out to our Indigenous neighbours and ask what they need at this time.

Let us begin conversations with our neighbours.

Let us raise our voices to the call on our government demanding a review of the judicial system that continues to fail Indigenous people all across the country.

Let us support a government that is calling for change to jury selection, let us pressure that government to appeal the verdict,

let us rage, hold one another, pray and march –

most of all, let us show up.

The path of Truth and Reconciliation is and will be a long one - generations long. Let us do what we can to ensure that the path grows ever smoother as we and those who will follow continue the journey.
