MINISTERIAL MUSINGS



Every so often I attend the Canada Day breakfast at the Leg - the one provided by the Muslim community. And if I stay long enough, I enjoy the swearing in ceremony of new Canadian citizens.

If you have never been, they process down to the outdoor amphitheatre from the Leg, some wearing the national dress of their birth countries, a colourful festival that ranges from kilts to jalabiyas. A few years ago we brought our newly arrived Syrian refugee family. In his weak English, Mahammad pointed to the new Canadians on the stage and turned to me and said, "Me...one day!" At a ceremony that tends to fill me with pride, that day stands out.

When I see the Hon. Maxime Bernier forming a party that in early days smells a lot like the nationalist and populist parties we see elsewhere, it makes my heart sick. The idea of claiming that there was ever some pure and unchanging Canada that needs to be reclaimed seems silly. 90 per cent of the people in this land come from settler stock. There is no pure moment of the past in this ever changing ever evolving nation.

I will grant that the government can probably do a better job of fairly managing immigration, but I don't think that's the issue. The real issue is fear. It's usually the driving issue in racism and nationalism. Some people fear what they do not know. They fear the 'other', whether that 'other' looks different, dresses differently, worships differently...you get the idea.

The 'other' threatens our comfortable world and that makes many people afraid. Sadly, too many politicians are once again seizing on this fear of the 'other' - this boogeyman in order to advance agendas that close off communication, close off dialogue, close off economic and cultural growth.

Look at history. Such isolationism, such nationalism has seldom worked for very long, and usually ended in sadness and even war. If it has brought short term benefit, it is usually only for those at the top of the food chain.

I will support a multicultural, welcoming, open-handed, open-hearted Canada for as long as I live. We have lots. We can share.

What are Congregational Companions? Read on...

Unitarians reject dogma and rituals that are restrictive and limiting. But some of the more traditional religious practices have their use. Take prayer, as an example. What if we could take the idea of prayer and remove all of the “problem stuff”? No beseeching or bargaining, no begging for grace or apologizing for sin. What might we be left with? Is there any part worth trying to save? Could the practice have meaning for us, especially those suffering emotional and spiritual pain? I believe it can. And that the effort will be rewarding and enriching for those who choose to participate.

We don’t really have a role for a kind of ‘chaplain’ who could help with that in our church. Which makes sense, given that many of our congregants reject the traditional ideas of God and the practices that go along with those ideas. But I wondered, how could we modify this practice and the role to make it meaningful and relevant to our congregants today?

Our starting point on this journey is a name change. Both terms, prayer and chaplain, carry baggage. We need better terms that suit us. We have come up with Congregational Companions.

A Congregational Companion will serve as a support person for their fellow congregants. To actively, deeply listen to them, hold space for them, be empathetic to their issues and concerns. They will not be therapists. They will not be ministers. They will be companions, sharing their fellow congregants’ journey...

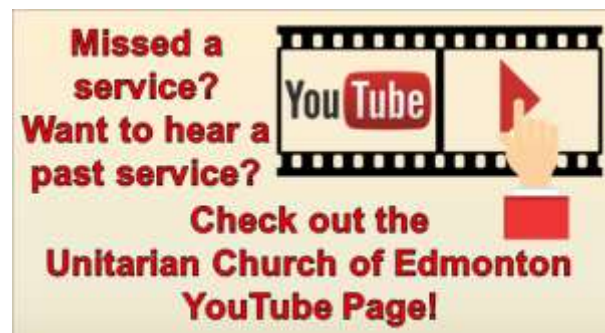

Coffee Hour Caution

...advice for greeting young adults at church

X - Avoid saying:

“How old are you?”

Why: Is age so important? There's no good answer. Avoid this one altogether.

✓ - Say instead:

“What did you think of the service today?”

X - Avoid saying:

“Are you new here?”

Why: A young adult may have been attending for years, you just haven't met them. This implies you think they don't belong in the church.

✓ - Say instead:

“I don't think we've met, my name is...”

X - Avoid saying:

“When are you planning to have kids?”

Why: Having or not having kids is a private matter and not one people may want to discuss. This implies you only value young adults for their future children, not as a peer adult, here and now.

✓ - Say instead:

“What brought you here today?”

X - Avoid saying:

“What do you do?” or “What year are you in school?”

Why: For those who are un- or under-employed, work is a tricky question; assuming someone is a student implies you think they are of a certain age or life stage. Give them the chance to talk about whatever is meaningful, which might not be school or a job.

✓ - Say instead:

“So tell me about yourself...”

X - Avoid saying:

“We need more young people!”

Why: Like everyone else, young adults want to be seen for who they are, not as a token for their age.

✓ - Say instead:

“Great to meet you!”

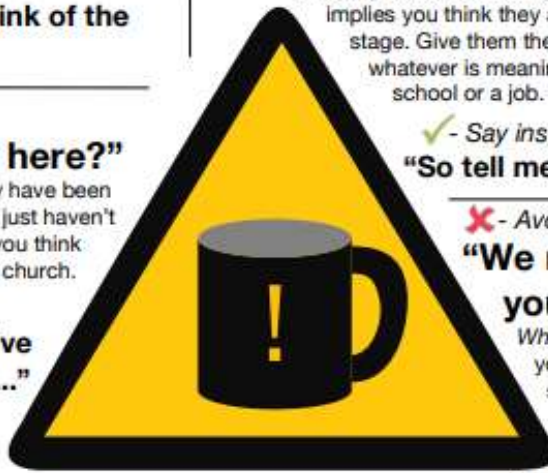
X - Avoid saying:

“Have you met our other young adult?”

Why: Young adults enjoy friends of all ages. Welcome them into faith and fellowship.

“Can I introduce you to my friend?”

Snow Removal – We are looking for some hardy volunteers who can keep the main doors and fire exits clear of snow on Sundays before the service and throughout the week if possible. There are 6 emergency exits at the church. On the south are the main doors, the door by the mail box, and an emergency exit in the sanctuary. On the west side is an emergency exit from the vestry and the main doors to the hall. On the north side there is an emergency exit from the hall and another one beside the kitchen. The three main entrances will need sand or ice melt as required. The sidewalk on 119th Street is also in need of snow clearing and sanding throughout the winter.

AROUND OUR CHURCH (UPDATED)

If you see a non-emergency problem, i.e. something that is broken or a spill not cleaned up, please follow these guidelines (if you are able):

1. Photograph the issue and email it to the Office Administrator: chadmin@uce.ca including the date and time you first noticed or call the Office and leave a message if I'm not able to answer.
2. If it's a hazard for falling or other injury, please do your best to clean it safely (there are cleaning supplies under the sinks and coffee nook cupboards and in the unlocked Caretaker's Room (in the back hallway).
3. If it's something that will stain (i.e. marker scribbles on table), your early attempt to clean it may prevent it from being more difficult to remove later.
4. If it's broken, please ensure that it will not get damaged further or cause injury to anyone and notify the Administrator. Thank you for your vigilance!

● **UCE is a scent-free zone.** We have members, some of them small children, with severe allergies. So avoid wearing any scents when you come to gatherings at the church – colognes, hair spray, etc. Also please remember when cleaning church property (tablecloths, counter tops, dishes, etc.) to use scent-free products.

● **Brunch:** Going for brunch after church is a UCE tradition. Want to join? Contact Marge Roche or Jennifer Hinchcliffe at church.

● **Recycling:** We don't have recycling pickup at the church, so we need help with taking blue bags home for home collection or to the Recycle Centre. The bags are in the kitchen and/or social hall

● **Walls:** Please do not use scotch tape on a painted wall. If you need a sign printed and posted in the church please contact the office, chadmin@uce.ca .

● **Pop Cans:** We raise money from returnable bottles, tetra packs etc. donated by members. Drop your contribution in the second storage room (the single door) in Keeler Hall.

● **Food:** If you use our kitchen, clean it up afterward and don't leave any food behind. Public Health Regulations prohibit the storing of perishable food for more than one day

● **Security:** If your committee or groups are meeting after Church hours, please make sure all the exit doors are locked before setting the alarm and leaving. The exits that need to be checked are Keeler Hall and the side door (on the same as the main doors, by the picnic table).

From time to time, members and friends of UCE find themselves in need of certain tools or other items for the short term and would like to borrow them instead of purchasing.
