Ministerial Musings

Speaking of learning...so this happened:



On Thursday, February 9th our 13 year old van was stolen form a store parking lot. "Bluie" had been part of our family for a decade. There are a lot of fond memories.

That Sunday night and I learned that the RCMP had 'recovered' it. Turns out it was in not one but two high speed chases over the weekend. A Constable from the local RCMP detachment spoke to me. He said that he was in the first on Friday night but broke off pursuit. On Sunday he was alerted that the van was

coming his way from Wetaskiwin so he set up for them. After a short pursuit the driver went off the road and crashed into a light post. As you can see the driver did a very thorough job of crashing. Three people were arrested and some others managed to get away. Odd to think of your vehicle could be involved in something like that!

The next day my younger daughter wrote, "R.I.P. Bluie the Van. You will be dearly missed. You lived an entire 12 or 13 years. You had a good life and you served your purpose."

Being a social media type I posted it all on Facebook and drew the response of nearly 100 people. The only post I ever offered that drew more attention (understandably) was last spring when that same daughter broke her arm.

The next day there was also a private email - an offer of a vehicle of similar vintage for the sum of \$1. I was speechless, but fortunately my fingers worked through the welling of tears so I was able to type, "Yes, thank you." It turns out that the Santa Fe (renamed 'Fei') is in considerably better condition that Bluie. What a gift!

So the learnings?

*Even on a cold night when you don't think it will restart, don't leave your old van running for 8 minutes. *Don't Panic! (Thanks, Douglas Adams). It does no good.

*The EPS and the RCMP can be very kind and gentle when dealing with people.

*Even insurance companies can be understanding!

*Once in a while there are good and generous people who will save you from your mistakes and ask nothing in return.

Although I like the idea of karma, I am not sure I believe in it. Too often terrible things have happened to good people I know, things they did not deserve. I don't think I either deserved or did not deserve to have my car stolen. It just happened. I don't think I deserved to have a new-to-me car drop in my lap either, but I sure am grateful.

The biggest learning was this: We all have the opportunity to look out for those among us who are having a struggle, be it theft, illness or hard times. We all have the opportunity to do whatever we reasonably can and to offer help with no expectation of reward. And maybe when you are the recipient, you have an obligation to pass it on.

When the time comes to sell Fei, I won't ask more than \$1.

Be a National Delegate

For the first time ever, our national UU organization is holding its annual meeting primarily as an on-line affair. The Canadian Unitarian Council's meeting will be in Toronto on Saturday, May 13. But because there is no annual conference this year, it's expected that few people will fly to Toronto merely for the annual meeting.

Instead, most delegates to the meeting will participate via computer hookup. So, why not become a UCE delegate at this meeting? It's your chance to learn how the national organization works.

We get four delegates, and I will be one of them – in person in Toronto, because I sit on the CUC board. But we need three other people. You need to be a church member, be willing to spend some hours watching and participating in a meeting via computer, and willing to learn a bit about it all beforehand.

The main business will be voting on a proposed change in the way congregations support the CUC – it's called the Annual Program Contribution. Right now we pay \$93 per member each year. There are some who think that encourages congregations to downplay their membership count. So a new method is being proposed, one in which congregations would pay a percentage of their annual expenditures as their CUC payment.

On meeting day, you will likely gather at our church around a big TV to attend the meeting. Hopefully other church members will join you – we'll make sure you have something to eat. It may also be possible to participate from your home; I have to check this out.

The CUC is holding orientation sessions about how to do on-line participation and voting. If you're interested in learning, let me know and I'll arrange it.

Lay Chaplaincy Training

The Lay Chaplaincy program allows congregations to empower and license individuals to perform weddings, memorials and other rites of passage on behalf of the congregation, usually for non-members. Lay Chaplains are paid for these services on a per event basis. A Lay Chaplain works closely with the minister and is required to attend a weekend training session (Friday evening through Sunday morning). Westwood will be hosting such a session on March 10-12. This year is special because President Jimmy Carter will be coming to launch one of the biggest builds this summer. Thank you to those who have signed up. We will have fun and meet people from other congregations who are committed to working with the City of Edmonton, Homeward Trust and Habitat for Humanity to help end homelessness and poverty. Truly a work from our hearts to the hearts of those in need. See Audrey Brooks about becoming a part of this Year's Habitat build. If this hasn't convinced you, here's a ringing endorsement from Rosemary Falconer:

Picture your granny wielding a nail gun or operating a table saw. What is in your picture? Screams for help and missing digits? If so, you have probably never been to a Habitat for Humanity Interfaith build. Several of the members of this congregation have participated, had a great time doing so, and come away intact. There is an opportunity to get involved this spring. If you choose to attend, you will be given assignments within your capability. The staff and experienced volunteers teach and supervise us, as well as ensure the finished product meets standards. The work shift is from 0800 to 1530. You will be given all required safety equipment and coverage by WCB. Snacks and lunch are provided. It is a great opportunity for a new adventure alongside your fellow Unitarians. - 🕀 On Tuesday, January 30th, Anglican Bishop Jane Alexander presented an update on the End Poverty Edmonton, to the Steering Committee of the Capital Region Interfaith Initiative on Homelessness and Affordable Housing. This involves a community plan to end poverty and create shared prosperity for all Edmontonians. Currently, 108.000 Edmontonians- including 34, 000 children are living in poverty. In March, 2014, Edmonton City Council created the Mayor's Task Force to Eliminate Poverty. The Task Force was co-chaired by Mayor Don Iveson and Bishop Jane Alexander. Jeff Bisanz from the Unitarian Church of Edmonton serves on that Committee and Audrey Brooks volunteers on the board of the Interfaith Steering Committee on Homelessness and Affordable Housing. A community plan is based on consultation with Indigenous leaders, newcomers, business, community agencies, educators, and people with lived experiences worked together to come up with a road map that involves:
- \oplus Creating of EndPovertyEdmonton, as a convening entity. * A target of lifting 10,000 people out of poverty in 5 years.
- 🕀 Five strategic goals with actions to be implemented in the first five years. * An Evaluation Approach to track progress.

An advocacy agenda focused on policy and systems change. * A guide to first steps in Transition and Year One. A detailed copy of the End Poverty in a Generation Road Map is available on the credenza in the foyer. Opportunities for Interfaith groups to become involved include choosing parts of the plan to implement by members of churches and Social Justice groups. Watch for more information at the March 5 Action Fair to be held in Keeler Hall at UCE.
