Treasurer's Report

Dorothy Keeler has joined our Endowment Committee, which is headed by Beth Jenkins and needs new members. This committee has important work to do. Our Endowment Fund has grown from \$25,000 in 2011 to \$80,000 today. It's currently sitting in an account that earns .35 per cent interest, so we have to think seriously about investment possibilities. About \$5,000 of the money needs to be held back to pay interest on our debenture debt, but the rest needs a better home.

Dorothy also wants to raise the profile of the Endowment Fund, to remind people how important it is to our longterm future. Contributing to the fund is a good way to remember long-time church members on their death, for instance.

Notable Unitarians



James Luther Adams (1901 – 1994), an American professor at Harvard Divinity School as well as at Meadville Lombard in Chicago, was a Unitarian Parish Minister and the most influential theologian among American UUs in the 20th century. Indeed at the time of his death, he was recognized as one of the preeminent Christian social ethicists and theologians of the 20th century. In his work, he emphasized personal and institutional behavior as the locus of meaning in religious belief and key to the structure of our churches --- belief without action and commitments was not worthy of UUs.

He was also a labor activist and civil rights advocate; journal editor; distinguished scholar, translator, and editor of major German theological works. He also was a founding member of three major study groups to help our clergy gain theological clarity, devotional strength,

spiritual solidarity and stamina for personal and institutional ethical action in the world.

His influence was enormous. He visited Germany in the 1930s and warned colleagues about the profound dangers of Nazism. There he met Karl Barth, Paul Tillich and Albert Schweitzer. Later famous journalists such as Chris Hedges were influenced by him and spoke on his work at one of the James Luther Adams Foundation lectures. Back in 1973 I attended the General Assembly of the UUA in and was excited to hear him lecture, being, however, only dimly aware of his fame at that time.

NB. Christine was loaned a US dollar with the head of Susan B. Anthony, last month's Notable Unitarian, on it so if anyone wishes to see it, do just ask as it is in her wallet.
