I am grateful to be living in a time where technology allows us to stay in touch with each other and the world. I've been thinking a lot about gratitude and connection and how important they will be to weather a long period of increased isolation.

I'm grateful for the creativity people show to make connections. I'm sure many of you have heard the stories of Italian neighbours singing to each other from their balconies, and a Spanish apartment block doing aerobics together with the instructor leading from the roof.

And there are great stories in our own city – people posting pictures in their windows or writing chalk messages on their sidewalks. Younger, healthy people volunteering to get groceries for those at higher risk. We even had an opera singer give a free concert from her river valley apartment balcony.

These acts of gratitude and kindness are what will get us through these uncertain times. We have always known our congregations are not just our buildings, and they are not just on Sundays. They are each of us, and they are every day. They are the connections that we create between ourselves and our world.

May we all be well, may we hold each other in community, and may we take the strength we gain from each other to better serve the world.

Living Gratefully in the Time of Corona Virus

In the midst of times of <u>uncertainty</u> it serves us to reflect on how gratefulness might help to calm us, reduce fears and expectations, open us to greater clarity and love, and fuel action grounded in our deep intentions.

So, what might [gratefulness] mean with regard to how we respond to the immediate concerns of COVID-19? In the midst of losses, how can we direct our attention toward the gifts that remain in our lives so as to build greater capacity to face what is challenging? Here are some possibilities:

Reflect on Goodness — Reflect with gratitude on the sacrifices of front-line workers and all those who are self-quarantining; adjusting habits and lives; working overtime to do research, make tests and vaccines, and provide important, accurate and timely information. Notice the many ways you can orient your attention to notice all the ways that people are caring for fellow human beings around the globe.

Wash your Hands — The 20 seconds recommended to "lather up" offer us an opportunity to slow down to experience gratitude for the gift of hot and cold running water, the miracle of soap, and the wonder of our hands themselves. Consider making a sacred ritual of washing your hands, welcoming the opportunity to meditate on these blessings.

Stay Connected — If steering clear of events, might this be an opportunity to connect by phone, text or email with family, friends, and neighbors? How does it feel to reflect with gratitude on the relationships in our lives and let people know we care about them? Keep in touch and offer <u>connection</u> in all the ways that you can.

Be Generous — Extend compassion to those whose lives are impacted most by this <u>crisis</u>. Give to organizations whose operations and fundraising efforts are being impacted but whose services will be needed more than ever. Support local businesses struggling as many of us stay home. Consider making a donation in someone's honor or buying a gift certificate.

See the Privileges of the Ordinary — In the midst of a focus on how much is being lost, keep noticing all the blessings that remain. Allow yourself to appreciate and be in awe of what is available to you: phones, electricity, showers, the beauty and resilience of the natural world, all the parts of your body that work, the services and systems that serve your ability to function, and so much more.

Commit to that which Sustains You — Allow yourself to stay grounded in the things that preserve your integrity and reinforce the beliefs that help you have faith and hope in difficult times. Maintain or increase the <u>rituals</u>, traditions, <u>reminders</u>, and <u>practices</u> that help you to find calm in the midst of any storm.

People wake up to ordinary days all the time and then, somehow, as though things were just too peaceful, they experience drastic reversals of fortune. The car resting on its roof. I know that these reversals will test you. You may move through, burdened with a fresh, wet grief. Or for now, you may arrive at this moment unscathed:

What you need to know is that there is nothing larger than the love that is your destiny. And the love may, at times, feel opaque and distant, like a looming thundercloud, too far to reach. If that's too hard to locate, find your breath, a thread of your life. Find your community, friendly face and open hand. What's true is that some changes call for every skill that we possess. The deeper truth remains: changes will eventually change. Let your heart flex. Let it grow. Allow a reversal to be a moment in which you are the constant, while you give yourself kindness and heaping, joyful love.

Leadership Committee Seeks Committed and Engaged Candidates!

Our UU Principles call us to affirm and promote the right of conscience and the use of democratic process within our congregations and in society at large. Each year our Annual General Meeting (AGM) provides us with the opportunity to act on that principle as the congregation elects candidates for the Board, the Ministerial Relations Committee and the Leadership Committee (formerly known as the Nominating Committee). Our Bylaws require all candidates to be members of the Congregation.

The **Board of Trustees** is responsible for managing the property of the Church, the conduct and administration of its business and general supervisions of the programs and activities of the Church. At each AGM we elect a President and a Vice-President to serve a one-year term each, and two Trustees to serve a two-year term each. We also elect a Secretary or a Treasurer in alternate years, and each of these officers serves a two-year term. A member of the Board may serve a variety of positions but only for six consecutive years.

The **Ministerial Relations Committee** acts as liaison between the Minister and the congregation and provides insight to the Minister regarding the life of the Church and how it is functioning. This committee consists of four members elected by the congregation, and a fifth member named by the Minister. Two members of this committee are elected at each AGM to serve a two-year term.

The **Leadership Committee** is responsible for presenting to each AGM a list of eligible candidates willing to stand for election to vacancies on the Board of Trustees, the Ministerial Relations Committee and the Leadership Committee. In 2017, bylaw changes added facilitating the training, election and succession of Church leaders to the duties of the committee. This committee consists of four members. Two members are elected at each AGM to serve a two-year term. We have one candidate willing to serve on the committee, and will be seeking an additional candidate to serve for a two-year term.

At the 2020 AGM, the Secretary will be elected for a two-year term and we have already confirmed one candidate for that position. We also have one candidate for Trustee, and will be seeking an additional candidate.

A slate of nominated individuals will be presented at the AGM. If there are more candidates than there are vacant positions, elections by written ballot will be conducted. Nominations may also be made from the floor.

Our History: Chapter 2

One of the most interesting ministers the Unitarian Church of Edmonton ever had was Bob Wrigley. Although he was with us only a few years, 1965 to 1969, Wrigley is still remembered for his powerful sermons. Most of them were on social and political issues – the Vietnam War, Malcom X, premarital sex – and they reflected Wrigley's radical take on things. When he left UCE, he quit the ministry and worked for years in rural Alberta as an oil rig worker, electrician and other jobs. He was always as much a Quaker as he was a Unitarian, so it was fitting that his death in 2011 was marked by a memorial meeting in the Quaker manner held at our church.

Wrigley's sermons were printed at the time as pamphlets, for sale for 15 cents. Want to read one of them? Send me an email at <u>ruttans@shaw.ca</u> and I'll send you a 1965 sermon titled *Our Friendship* with the Society of Friends.
