President's Message: Our connection to each other and this community remains

Our time in this place may have ended, but our connection to each other and this community remains.

Together may we walk the path of justice, speak words of love, live the selfless deed, trod gently upon the earth, and fill the world with compassion.

Until we meet again, blessed be.

These words, by Rev. Kathy Huff, were designed as the closing words for a service but they seem appropriate to me in many ways right now.

Our time in the world we knew as "normal" seems to have ended. However, as evidenced by the phone calls, emails and visits between members, and strong attendance at online services and coffee hours, our connection to each other and this community is very important and remains.

Ironically, it is because the community and connection are so important that the board decided to not resume in-person services this summer; we feel that the health risks are still too high.

I also think our time in "this place" of just UCE may have ended, and our definition of "this community" can enlarge. Our connections with the larger UU community have dwindled over the last few years. Now, thanks to technology, we can "attend" UU services, book clubs, discussion groups, singalongs, concerts, and coffee hours right across the country – and the world. On May 17, I "attended" the service that was part of the CUC annual gathering. Over 700 other UUs shared in that online experience. It was moving and energizing to see and hear the different approaches and perspectives. This access presents a wonderful opportunity for us as we imagine how we want to grow and operate in the coming years.

Working toward justice, love, and compassion for ourselves, our community and our Earth is something I see alive and modeled in the lives of UCE members. What is so special about UCE is that we aspire to build this better world *together*. It is nourishing and comforting to be part of this community.

We also dream of widening our community, so others can find sustenance and hope and a place to help them live out their values. Volunteers have done amazing work over the last few months to ensure we remain an active presence for those seeking community. I cannot say thank you enough to everyone who has contributed.

I also know that some people's energy is waning, either from the sense of constant anxiety due to COVID-19 or from the extra tasks they have taken on to keep UCE operating smoothly (or both). Given this, I'm happy to say things are progressing positively with the interim minister search. While it's too early for any announcements, having a great minister in September to help coordinate and guide our efforts is looking very likely.

And finally, Rev. Huff's closing words speak to me because this is my last message as UCE president. It has been an honour to serve in the role for the last three years. Thank you for the opportunity and for your support. I look forward to serving as past president for the next year, and welcome Karen Bilida as president. She has great ideas, abundant energy and such a passion for UCE and Unitarianism in general – we are in good hands.

A SEED KNOWS HOW TO WAIT

A seed knows how to wait. Most seeds wait for several years before starting to grow; a cherry seed can wait for a hundred years with no problem. What exactly each seed is waiting for is known only to that seed. Some unique trigger-combination of temperature-moisture-light and many other things is required to convince a seed to jump off the deep end and take its chance—to take its one and only chance to grow.

A seed is alive while it waits. Every acorn on the ground is just as alive as the three-hundred yearold oak tree that towers over it. Neither the seed nor the old oak is growing, they are both just waiting. Their waiting differs, however, in that the seed is waiting to flourish while the tree is only waiting to die. When you go into a forest you probably tend to look up at the plants that have grown so much taller than you ever could. You probably don't look down, where just beneath your single footprint sits between one hundred and one thousand seeds, each one alive and waiting... When you are in the forest, for every tree that you see, there are no less than three million more trees waiting in the soil, fervently wishing to be.

When the embryo within a seed starts to grow, it basically just stretches out of its doubled-over waiting posture, elongating into official ownership of the form that it assumed years ago. The hard coat that surrounds a peach pit, a sesame or mustard seed, or a walnut's shell mostly exists to prevent this expansion. In the laboratory, we simply scratch the hard coat and add a little water and it's enough to make almost any seed grow. I must have cracked thousands of seeds over the years, and yet the next day's green never fails to amaze me. Something so hard can be so easy if you just have a little help. In the right place, under the right conditions, you can finally stretch out into what you're supposed to be.

Each beginning is the end of a waiting. We are each given exactly one chance to be. Each of us is both impossible and inevitable. Every replete tree was first a seed that waited.

SJC Newsletter Blurb, May 2020

During the month of May, the UCE Social Justice Crew has been keeping busy with socially-distanced advocacy and activism. Although we are unable to meet or act as a group, we are still working on the issues closest to our hearts, even if we're doing it separately! Here are just a few of the activities members have been engaged in during this pandemic:

Audrey Brooks has been taking care of her homeless neighbours while outside doing yard work. She's been able to provide counselling and referral to resources, as well as food packages and loose change, to the folks she meets in the alley behind her home. Audrey has also been visiting with isolated church members, and preparing for the Annual Genocide Memorial in July.

Jeff Bisanz continues to work with various initiatives (EndPovertyEdmonton, the Edmonton Council for Early Learning and Care, the Muttart Foundation, and the Community-University Partnership for the Study of Children, Youth, and Families) on developing a system of high-quality, affordable early learning and care for young children and their families, especially for Edmonton's most vulnerable families.

Ali Hammington was volunteering to pack food hampers for seniors through Fresh Routes until travel on transit became unsafe. She is now working with her community league to open the Community Garden and install a honeybee hive, and to set up a weekly low-cost fruit and veggie market. Ali will also be working with a pair of summer students to find socially-distant ways of keeping neighbours connected this summer.

Marilyn Gaa, along with a few of the Raging Grannies, went out on April 22 with banners and placards to raise awareness about Earth Day. Marilyn has also been involved with her neighbourhood's community cleanup, and is collaborating with Project Ploughshares on a commemoration of the bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

Donna Hamer has been participating in her neighbourhood cleanup program, and went to UCE to collect the trash and litter from our garden. Donna has also been shopping and running errands for isolated seniors in her building.

Rosemary Falconer has been keeping busy, despite breaking her collarbone while cross-country skiing at the beginning of the pandemic! Rosemary has been providing childcare for a single mom who needs to complete schoolwork while daycares are closed. She's also keeping in touch with her clients from the Welcome Home program by phone, until it's safe for her to visit them in person again.

When the days are warmer we gather at Government House at the former Museum, remembering, of course to keep our distance.
- It takes a lot of time and energy to change from church-oriented services, where we interact on a personal level with each other, to a Zoom program with all the technical aspects that must be put together to make everything happen. We have powerful and heart-warming services each week, with thanks to Karen Bilida, Scott Harrison, Bill Lee, Geoff Jackson; Jeff Bisanz, Jennifer Askey, Anne Barker, Carrie Day. Susan Ruttan, Andrew Mills and many others who make things work.
- Yvonne enjoyed a patio visit through her door, with Gordon and Robert, and would like more such visits from us. Yvonne is particularly isolated because of fragile health issues, and, as you can imagine, is feeling this deeply. Call, a visit, do something zany to help keep her spirits up would be a gift to be enjoyed and remembered.
- Some people, like Karen Mills are still working long hours from home: to those people, make sure to take time for yourself. To those who are retired and looking for something to do, don't worry, you will soon find yourself being busy, like Andrew Mills, who just replaced all the lights in our church sanctuary. He did it safely while up on a high scaffold, by using an app that kept watch over his movements. What a great idea. Some of us didn't like him working alone up there.
- Marilyn Gaa and her neighbourhood managed to keep social distance while offering to share extra plants with each other by putting them out on their driveways on May 16th, and also having a supervised swap at their local community league, on the 17th. Its good to have plants that come from friends, because they are more likely to be successful in your own yard, so the story goes.
- Gordon shared a blessing he found as he was coming out of a restaurant, that fits with our UU perspective, I think: "thank you for the food before us, the friends beside us, and the love between us."
- There are church folk who are forming walking groups in their areas, so you may want to check this out, now that we have warmer weather. Robert B. walks for an hour in the river valley, from his home in Sundance, and Art Breier walks up the stairs in his building instead of taking the elevator. Vic Romanyshyn attached two long handrails to my basement steps so I can safely run up and down them without breaking my neck, since my eyesight is aging out along with the rest of me.
- On Friday, May 15th John Marsh was admitted to Yale Hospital with a suspected stroke. He had emergency surgery with a good outcome. May 18th, another surgery was needed which again appears to have gone well. John remains in the ICU under close observation as of May 20th.

- Open the prescheduled Sunday Service meeting
- Say Hi to people as they join
- Make people that are speaking during the service and assisting with the volunteer roles "co-hosts" (see participants list, click more, assign as host or cohost)

The person that "opened" the church makes the person that will be hosting breakout rooms the "Host" (only "hosts" can create breakout rooms)

The after-service breakout rooms role




Our History: Chapter Four

It's easy to keep connected and let others know about UCE. Here are a few Facebook and Twitter tips:

- "Follow" or "Join" the account/group. This allows UCE posts to show up in your feed.
- Like an existing post by simply clicking on the "thumbs up" or heart icon. This not only shows your appreciation, but affects the site's algorithm and helps ensure more people see the post.
- Share or retweet an existing post. Were you inspired by a service? Share the post with the link to the YouTube video or podcast.
- **Comment on a post**. This both creates a conversation and "boosts" the post so the likelihood of people seeing it increases.
- **Post your own content.** This is what really keeps social media lively and interesting and helps create connections. Posts don't have to be long or profound. In fact, short is better. Share a joke, a question, a quote that speaks to you, or a great photo. Original content helps show the real people who make up the community.
 - Be positive and use images with your posts. The items that get the most shares tend to be those that are positive, inspirational and/or funny. Pictures grab people's attention, increase shares, and carry the greatest weight in algorithms (meaning the post gets shown more and "rises to the top" of people's feeds).

If we all did just one of these steps once a week, it would give our connections a real boost and help non-UCE people know what a great thing we have going on here. Happy connecting!
