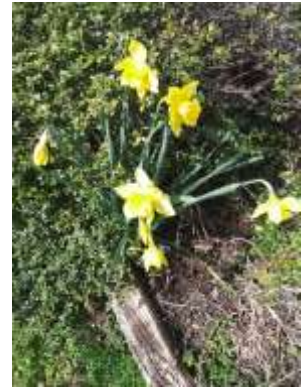
Minister's Message

Dear Ones,

Here in Virginia, Spring has sprung. I know it's true, because the daffodils at the end of my front walk are blooming!

This Spring, we're already experiencing an unusual number of damp days. Yesterday's storm caused standing water in places around the yard that had never before been so wet. Much of my side and back yard became a pond. It's official, 2020 broke temperature and precipitation records across the state. Climate change is real.

This is my second most favorite time of year (Fall being my favorite), because all the tiny wildflowers that some people consider weeds begin blooming all over my yard. They remind me that so much of our experience in this life depends on our perspective -- what others see as annoying weeds to be rid of, I see as beautiful models of natural resilience. They make me so happy! They are so small and so delicate and so persistent -- coming back year after year -- despite my brother-in-laws insistence on mowing them down! Pictures from my yard:



You may remember that this past Fall, one of my uncle's died. He and I shared a love of the English language and of the evolution of English literature -- both having majored in English at University. Each Spring, as my family gathered for Easter, my uncle would regale us with his rendition of Chaucer's ode to spring found in *The Canterbury Tales*. As is the case with mourning, I am tearing up a bit as I share with you this quintessential celebration of Spring (darkened "e"s are pronounced as separate syllable):

Whan Zephirus eek with his swete breeth
Inspired hath in every holt and heeth

That slepen al the nyght with open ye,
So priketh hem Nature in hir corsages,
Thanne longen folk to goon on pilgrimages . . .*

The Principles and Sources of our Religious Faith

UU congregations affirm and promote seven principles, which we hold as strong values and moral guides. As Rev. Barbara Wells ten Hove explains, “The principles are not dogma or doctrine, but rather a guide for those of us who choose to join and participate in UU religious communities.”



Our Seven Principles

- ⌘ The inherent worth and dignity of every person;
- ⌘ Justice, equity, and compassion in human relations;
- ⌘ Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations;
- ⌘ A free and responsible search for truth and meaning;
- ⌘ The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large;
- ⌘ The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all;
- ⌘ Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.

We live out these principles within a “living tradition” of wisdom and spirituality, drawn from such diverse sources as science, poetry, scripture, and personal experience.

Our Six Sources

- ⌘ Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces which create and uphold life;
- ⌘ Words and deeds of prophetic people which challenge us to confront powers and structures of evil with justice, compassion, and the transforming power of love;
- ⌘ Wisdom from the world’s religions which inspires us in our ethical and spiritual life;
- ⌘ Jewish and Christian teachings which call us to respond to God’s love by loving our neighbours as ourselves;
- ⌘ Humanist teachings which counsel us to heed the guidance of reason and the results of science, and warn us against idolatries of the mind and spirit;
- ⌘ Spiritual teachings of Earth-centred traditions which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature.
- ⌘ Grateful for the religious pluralism which enriches and ennobles our faith, we are inspired to deepen our understanding and expand our vision. As free congregations we enter into this covenant, promising to one another our mutual trust and support.

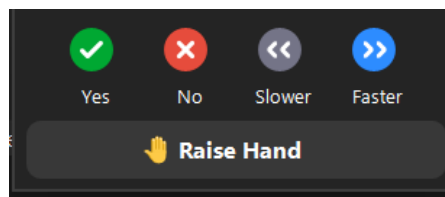
Unitarian Church of Edmonton (UCE) Annual General Meeting (AGM) is being held online again this year.

ITT Report to the Congregation

On Sunday, March 7th we asked you "What do we stand for?" We received responses from 31 persons. In the responses we received to this question, the predominant words used were the following:

Respect, support, acceptance, choice, equity, inclusion, worth and dignity, interdependent web, pluralism, responsible search for meaning and truth.

A number of the respondents noted a particular Principle in their response. Thoroughly considering all the responses, it appears that each of them relates in some particular to the Seven Principles.

As a member of this congregation, you may be interested to know that these responses are similar to those that were a part of discussions in our congregation in the era during which the statement of Seven Principles was being developed. Congregations across the UUA were all involved.

Update on Candidates for UCE Board

The Board of Trustees is responsible for managing the property of the Church, the conduct and administration of its business and general supervisions of the programs and activities of the Church. At each AGM we elect a President and a Vice-President to serve a one year term each, and two Trustees to serve a two-year term each. We also elect a Secretary or a Treasurer in alternate years, and each of these officers serves a two-year term. A member of the Board may serve a variety of positions but only for six consecutive years.

At the 2021 AGM the Treasurer will be elected for a two-year term. Doug Eastwell has stated his intent to not stand for Treasurer in the next term. The Leadership Committee has identified a candidate to fill that role.

We have identified two candidates for Trustee to fill a two-year term each. We have also found a candidate to fill the second year of a two-year term for Trustee, as that position is currently vacant. Candidates for Vice-President and President have also been found.

The Leadership Committee is currently seeking a candidate to fill an upcoming vacancy on this committee, as Rosemary Falconer will be completing her sixth consecutive year of service.

Candidates for the Ministerial Relations Committee will not be elected for the 2021-22 church year.

A slate of nominated individuals will be presented at the AGM, and in the May newsletter.

It is getting toward Tax Time and the Fraudsters are Working Hard!

Spoofed email scams continue throughout congregations around the world. Please be aware of scams.

- We will never need you to send an emergency gift card.
- A company will never ask for bitcoin or gift cards as payment.
- Nobody is calling you about your social insurance number.
- The CRA is not calling you about taxes.



If you receive a suspicious email that looks like it is from the Unitarian Church of Edmonton or any member of staff or the board, please call us directly (don't click on a link in the suspicious email but actually call us). Don't worry if you do not reach us right away; UCE can wait and your safety is more important.

A “spoofed” email is an email that looks very similar to an email from a friend or colleague that you know but the email address will be slightly different. This is not a case of “hacking”, it is someone pretending to be someone, not somebody actually getting into an email account. The person that has created this imitator email is trying a scam to get your personal information.

- Please do not respond to the email.
- Mark the email as spam.
- Let the person that is being imitated aware of the situation.

As always do not send your personal information through email. UCE has secure websites to gather information. Plus you can always call the church administrator (780-454-8073) with any questions.
