The first meeting of the Governance Implementation Team(GIT),Louise Charach, Lynne Turvey, Karen Mills and Rev Rosemary was held on September 16,2021 . We reviewed the many recommendations from the Financial Task Team and the Good Governance Task Team and talked about next steps.

Two key priorities championed by Rev Rosemary include working with UCE to develop a **Covenant**



of Right Relations and to embark on a **Strategic Planning** process. Expect to hear more about these important actions over the next months.

Under development are Terms of Reference for a committee and bylaw review. Draft Terms for the UCE board have been passed to the UCE board for review and finalization. The Finance committee and treasurer are tackling the Financial best practice report as we speak. We are reviewing policy manuals and member handbooks from other jurisdictions to assist with customizing these for UCE.

Each of us plays a role in good governance and soon we will be approaching volunteers to help revitalize our UCE vision.

It is a real honour to be on this GIT. We will keep you in the loop as we continue to work through the next steps to make our beloved church strong, accountable and inclusive.

You can sign up to be a Caring Connector – one who helps others. You can be a Receiver when you need a little something. You can be both. Unfortunately the COVID-19 pandemic situation has once again put this project on hold. However, feel free to sign up for the future. See details below.

Here is our list of offerings:

• Card Crew – mail cards for birthdays, special anniversaries, condolence,

etc.

- Transporters use your vehicle to take someone to church, to an appointment, shopping, or deliver a meal prepared by a nourisher
- Nourishers prepare soup or meal for delivery
- Visitors visit as a friend in hospital, long term care, confined at home, etc.
- Handihelps simple repairs or advice on home, garden, auto or technology
- Special Offers something unique to you that can benefit others

The Dispatcher will then send out a message to those willing to provide that offering, and link the two. As a Caring Connector, you will never be "assigned" a task, rather you have the opportunity to confirm your availability to assist in accordance with your own schedule and needs. 

The Principles and Sources of our Religious Faith

UU congregations affirm and promote seven principles, which we hold as strong values and moral guides. As Rev. Barbara Wells ten Hove explains, "The principles are not dogma or doctrine, but rather a guide for those of us who choose to join and participate in UU religious communities."



Our Seven Principles

- The inherent worth and dignity of every person;
- Justice, equity, and compassion in human relations;
- Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations;
- A free and responsible search for truth and meaning;
- The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large;
- The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all;
- Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.

We live out these principles within a "living tradition" of wisdom and spirituality, drawn from such diverse sources as science, poetry, scripture, and personal experience.

Our Six Sources

- Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces which create and uphold life;
- Words and deeds of prophetic people which challenge us to confront powers and structures of evil with justice, compassion, and the transforming power of love;
- Wisdom from the world's religions which inspires us in our ethical and spiritual life;
- Jewish and Christian teachings which call us to respond to God's love by loving our neighbours as ourselves;
- Humanist teachings which counsel us to heed the guidance of reason and the results of science, and warn us against idolatries of the mind and spirit;
- Spiritual teachings of Earth-centred traditions which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature.
- Grateful for the religious pluralism which enriches and ennobles our faith, we are inspired to deepen our understanding and expand our vision. As free congregations we enter into this covenant, promising to one another our mutual trust and support.
