Minister's Reflection: Happy New Year, and Why I Don't Make New Year's Resolutions



I would like to take this opportunity to wish everyone a happy and healthy New Year. I know that we are all hoping that 2022 brings with it a reprieve from COVID-19, with all its Greek lettered variants. This latest one, Omicron, appears to be rampant but not as severe. I hope for you all is that you stay safe and warm this January, and put precautions in place to help you miss Omicron's spikes.

January often brings with it the pressure and expectation to set New Year's resolutions. I for one will not be doing that, and I intentionally stopped making traditional New Year's resolutions years ago, and I encourage you to stop making them as well. Here's why. New Year's resolutions suggest that there is something wrong with you that you need to fix: that you're too this, or not enough of that. I wholeheartedly shout, NO, there is nothing wrong with you that you need to fix. You don't need to do anything

to make you a better person, and you certainly don't need the pressure of a New Year's resolution.

In my experience, and from the research, most New Year's resolutions fail, and then we go about the business of feeling bad about that too. So now we've doubled down on having bad feelings and thoughts about ourselves. Join UCE TV!

This season, the UCE tech team has been working on the details of broadcasting our Sunday services. What we have been doing is a hybrid service where the in-person service is streamed live to zoom and recorded. For the last few weeks we have been getting about 30 people in-person and 30 people on Zoom. Once we post the recorded services another 30 to 50 people view each service on YouTube.

To help us broadcast the services we have installed a very impressive new audiovisual system. The new equipment includes microphones and a digital sound

board, video cameras and a video mixer, a computer and software. We are rapidly learning how to use this new equipment and are making progress each service. It's like a TV control room now on the mezzanine!

Now we'd like to get more people to help! We need 3 people in the church on Sundays to help us operate the sound system, the cameras, and the computer. Our Eight Principles

- ⊕ The inherent worth and dignity of every person;
- ∃ Justice, equity, and compassion in human relations;
- ⊖ Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations;
- ⊖ A free and responsible search for truth and meaning;
- The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large;
- ⊕ The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all;
- Bespect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.
- Individual and communal action that accountably dismantles racism and systemic barriers to full inclusion in ourselves and our institutions

We live out these principles within a "living tradition" of wisdom and spirituality, drawn from such diverse sources as science, poetry, scripture, and personal experience.

Our Six Sources

- Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces which create and uphold life;
- Get Words and deeds of prophetic people which challenge us to confront powers and structures of evil with justice, compassion, and the transforming power of love;
- ⊖ Wisdom from the world's religions which inspires us in our ethical and spiritual life;
- Humanist teachings which counsel us to heed the guidance of reason and the results of science, and warn us against idolatries of the mind and spirit;
- Spiritual teachings of Earth-centred traditions which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature.
- Grateful for the religious pluralism which enriches and ennobles our faith, we are inspired to deepen our understanding and expand our vision. As free congregations we enter into this covenant, promising to one another our mutual trust and support.
