I recently read a farewell letter from a colleague who has been serving in leadership with the Unitarian Universalist Association. The thing that resonated with me was her comment of how our congregations are best served by shared ministry. The leadership that the minister on their own can provide is miniscule compared to the power of shared ministry. In order to share the ministry of the Unitarian Church of Edmonton, people need to know what to do. While there are many functional systems in place at UCE that keep things chugging along, there are a number of gaps in service that sharing the ministry could address.

At the beginning of this year, I identified four areas I wanted to focus my energy on.

- 1. Hospitality
- 2. Covenant
- 3. Membership team
- 4. Pastoral care team
- **1.** I began the year putting a lot of energy into hospitality. This is in my opinion, where UCE's biggest gap in service is. Hospitality is probably the most important component in community and congregational life, and it is optimum if looked after in a consistent and systematic way. What if UCE had a hospitality team that made sure everything was in place for coffee and snacks to be served every Sunday? What if that hospitality team also organized a monthly potluck, and the food for special occasions like the Blue Christmas service? The board will be working on this as well so stay tuned!
- **2.** Even though we now have a Covenant of Right Relations in place, the work continues. The Governance Implementation Team is working on the next steps that will be put into place. For example, what to do when things don't go well and we wish to make amends. Who do we talk to, what are the steps? Being part of a conventual community is new for UCE, we are learning how to be together in this new way.

- **3.** The hard-working membership policy and procedure team have put together wonderful policies and procedures that will soon be ready to be put in motion. A newly forming membership team will be meeting early in the new year to implement these procedures, as well as set up systems that will help to sustain and support membership at UCE. They will be looking for others to join.
- **4.** The newly forming pastoral care team leaders met recently and our goal is to have a functional and comprehensive pastoral care system in place by the end of this church year. They also will be looking for others to join them.

There are other areas that need your help. In the past, I've spent considerable amount of time setting up the sanctuary on Sunday mornings, procuring supplies, and attending to logistics for events. This takes away from my ability to properly prepare for Sunday service, and find the needed time for pastoral care and the other duties entrusted to me.

As you can see, there is plenty of room for you to be part of shared ministry. It is up to everyone to look after each other, to make sure we are living into our covenant, and to ensure the systems run smoothly.

I am excited about what 2024 will bring us!





- Assume good intent and goodwill

- Accept responsibility for our individual acts
- Address conflict promptly and ask for help when conflict is too difficult
- Be steadfast in support of our community in times of disagreement
- Share the ministry of the congregation through our gifts of time, talent and money
- Express encouragement and appreciation for the gifts of others

The Principles and Sources of our Religious Faith

UU congregations affirm and promote eight principles, which we hold as strong values and moral guides. As Rev. Barbara Wells ten Hove explains, "The principles are not dogma or doctrine, but rather a guide for those of us who choose to join and participate in UU religious communities."

Our Eight Principles

- The inherent worth and dignity of every person;
- Justice, equity, and compassion in human relations;
- Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations;
- A free and responsible search for truth and meaning;
- The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large;
- The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all;
- Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.
- Individual and communal action that accountably dismantles racism and systemic
- barriers to full inclusion in ourselves and our institutions

We live out these principles within a "living tradition" of wisdom and spirituality, drawn from such diverse sources as science, poetry, scripture, and personal experience.

Our Six Sources

- Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces which create and uphold life;
- Words and deeds of prophetic people which challenge us to confront powers and structures of evil with justice, compassion, and the transforming power of love;
- Wisdom from the world's religions which inspires us in our ethical and spiritual life;
- Jewish and Christian teachings which call us to respond to God's love by loving our neighbours as ourselves;
- Humanist teachings which counsel us to heed the guidance of reason and the results of science, and warn us against idolatries of the mind and spirit;
- Spiritual teachings of Earth-centred traditions which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature.
- Grateful for the religious pluralism which enriches and ennobles our faith, we are inspired to deepen our understanding and expand our vision. As free congregations we enter into this covenant, promising to one another our mutual trust and support.

Listen Everywhere



We have installed the Listen Everywhere service to replace our aging FM radios. This system will be in use for every service and available everywhere in the Church building and some of the parking lot.

To use the system, you will need to download and install the Listen Everywhere app from the google store, or apple store and you will need to connect to the UCE WIFI (password posted in church). Once you have done both steps, just open the app and start the session. It allows you to listen using your own headset, wireless earbuds, or if your phone is connected to your hearing aids, you will hear it there. Just as if you are listening to a phone call.

We will have people around to help if you need it, please ask.
