November's Ministerial Reflections

Danya Ruttenberg, from On Repentance and Repair

The work of repentance, all the way through is the work of transformation... It's the work of being open to seeing ourselves as we really are, of understanding that other people's needs and pain are at least as important—if not more so—than our own...It's about ownership—owning who we have been and what we have done, and also owning the person that we are capable of becoming.



On most Sundays, the benediction I offer at the end of the service is a quote I have adapted by L. R. Knost. In it, there is an acknowledgement that all things can break, and that all things can be mended, but not with time. Attention is needed if we wish to repair that which has broken. This month we are going to be exploring the Soul Matters theme: Living Love Through the Practice of Repair. I am so looking forward to exploring this important topic with the congregation because, at Danya Ruttenberg states, repair (repentance) is the work of transformation. This transformation can happen in our personal, work, casual, or congregational relationships. We aren't born knowing how to fix things when feelings are hurt, when the wrong thing has been said, and especially when big mistakes are made. There is so much more to fixing things than just saying, 'I'm sorry.' Ruttenberg encourages us to examine our intentions, look outside of ourselves, and take responsibility for our part of the problem.

I know I have much to learn and many things to improve about myself if I want to get better at repairing when I have made a mistake. I am excited to be engaging in this topic with you this month, as we learn how to be better together and individually. Ruttenberg encourages us to own the person and congregation we are capable of becoming!

I invite you to have a look at the excellent resources provided by the Soul Matters team each month. There are articles, videos, music, poetry, and other types of readings available to you each month on our theme. These materials will make your experience of our monthly themes more relevant and meaningful.

We are so grateful for the incredible work by Donna Hamar, Jan McMillan and their crew of volunteers over the years. But Donna and Jan are hanging up their aprons and putting away their price markers for a much-deserved rest. Another lead organizer (or organizers) will be needed, or alternative fundraisers coordinated. Ideas are welcome.

Endowment: Making a Difference Now and in the Future



Two phrases we hear a lot in the media these days: "a tribute to ..." and "making a difference." What if there's an easy way to combine both of those?

"Tributes" are a way to honour and draw attention to people and their actions that we admire. According to the dictionary, tributes demonstrate our respect and affection. They are thus important expressions of what we value.

Tributes could be signs or monuments, events, speeches or the written word. But how about a tribute that makes an enduring difference?

That's exactly what the UCE Endowment Fund was created to do. It is different from the "regular" contributions that we, as members and friends, give to the church to keep the lights on and the services happening.

To commemorate something significant --- say, a retirement, a wedding, a milestone birthday, the memory of a dear friend, a birth in the family --- people want to do something special and enduring. Contributions to the Endowment Fund are just that: they are not "used up" but they endure to generate income and to provide UCE with a nest egg for its long-term goals.

For example, in 2004 the Endowment Funds provided part of the capital necessary to buy and renovate this building to turn it into our new church "home." Without it, the move to a larger building might not have been possible.



The Principles and Sources of our Religious Faith

UU congregations affirm and promote eight principles, which we hold as strong values and moral guides. As Rev. Barbara Wells ten Hove explains, "The principles are not dogma or doctrine, but rather a guide for those of us who choose to join and participate in UU religious communities."

Our Eight Principles

- The inherent worth and dignity of every person;
- Justice, equity, and compassion in human relations;
- Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations;
- A free and responsible search for truth and meaning;
- The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large;
- The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all;
- Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.
- Individual and communal action that accountably dismantles racism and systemic
- barriers to full inclusion in ourselves and our institutions

We live out these principles within a "living tradition" of wisdom and spirituality, drawn from such diverse sources as science, poetry, scripture, and personal experience.

Our Six Sources

- Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces which create and uphold life;
- Words and deeds of prophetic people which challenge us to confront powers and structures of evil with justice, compassion, and the transforming power of love;
- Wisdom from the world's religions which inspires us in our ethical and spiritual life;
- Jewish and Christian teachings which call us to respond to God's love by loving our neighbours as ourselves;
- Humanist teachings which counsel us to heed the guidance of reason and the results of science, and warn us against idolatries of the mind and spirit;
- Spiritual teachings of Earth-centred traditions which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature.
- Grateful for the religious pluralism which enriches and ennobles our faith, we are inspired to deepen our understanding and expand our vision. As free congregations we enter into this covenant, promising to one another our mutual trust and support.

Listen Everywhere



We have installed the Listen Everywhere service to replace our aging FM radios. This system will be in use for every service and available everywhere in the Church building and some of the parking lot.

To use the system, you will need to download and install the Listen Everywhere app from the google store, or apple store and you will need to connect to the UCE WIFI (password posted in church). Once you have done both steps, just open the app and start the session. It allows you to listen using your own headset, wireless earbuds, or if your phone is connected to your hearing aids, you will hear it there. Just as if you are listening to a phone call.

We will have people around to help if you need it, please ask.
