

Edmund Hamilton Sears (1810-1876)

Did you know that E. Hamilton Sears was a Unitarian minister? This carol was written by Sears while he was recovering from a mental health crisis. His omission of any mention of the birth of Jesus brought much scorn from his more orthodox contemporaries. Still, it has now become one of North America's most beloved seasonal carols. I found out all this information from the Unitarian Universalist Advent calendar. This colourful calendar was created by Rev. Ralph Yeager Roberts. For every day in December leading up to the magical 25th day of December, Rev. Roberts has illustrated a fact about a how a Unitarian or Universalist, (or both) has contributed to the traditions or history of the Christmas season. Thank you to all who participated in the consultation sessions around our three new Healthy Relations policies, approved by the Board October,2024.

The policies are: Safe and Caring Conditions, Conflict Resolution and Destructive Behavior.

The Governance Advisory Team-Karen Mills, Lynne Turvey, Brandie Moller-Reid, and Louise Charach carefully reviewed your feedback. We clarified several definitions and added some where there were questions. You'll also note we revised the title of one policy(Safe and Caring Conditions) to better reflect the purpose and content. The decision was made to not combine the policies in order to keep the notions of conflict (which can be healthy) and destructive behavior (negative and unhealthy) distinct.

These new policies will be regularly highlighted in our newsletter for your reference and key aspects of these policies will be communicated on a regular basis as they become a part of our everyday life.

The Right Relations Team (Lynn Wolff, Carol Hutchings, Andrea Graham, Louise Charach) have met to thoroughly review their role to help build and maintain healthy and respectful relationships within our church family. Please contact us anytime with questions, thoughts, ideas.



TAXABLE CAPITAL GAINS? SAVE TAX BY DONATING

This has actually happened at UCE: individuals discover that one of their investments has gained in value over time, and if they sell or otherwise dispose of it, they will have to pay capital gains tax on half of the increase.

But there's a legal dodge! If you donate "securities" (example, bonds, shares, mutual funds, etc.) directly to a charity, you can avoid that tax. Plus you receive a charitable receipt for the market value of the security you donated.



The Principles and Sources of our Religious Faith

UU congregations affirm and promote eight principles, which we hold as strong values and moral guides. As Rev. Barbara Wells ten Hove explains, "The principles are not dogma or doctrine, but rather a guide for those of us who choose to join and participate in UU religious communities."

Our Eight Principles

- The inherent worth and dignity of every person;
- Justice, equity, and compassion in human relations;
- Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations;
- A free and responsible search for truth and meaning;
- The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large;
- The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all;
- Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.
- Individual and communal action that accountably dismantles racism and systemic
- barriers to full inclusion in ourselves and our institutions

We live out these principles within a "living tradition" of wisdom and spirituality, drawn from such diverse sources as science, poetry, scripture, and personal experience.

Our Six Sources

- Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces which create and uphold life;
- Words and deeds of prophetic people which challenge us to confront powers and structures of evil with justice, compassion, and the transforming power of love;
- Wisdom from the world's religions which inspires us in our ethical and spiritual life;
- Jewish and Christian teachings which call us to respond to God's love by loving our neighbours as ourselves;
- Humanist teachings which counsel us to heed the guidance of reason and the results of science, and warn us against idolatries of the mind and spirit;
- Spiritual teachings of Earth-centred traditions which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature.
- Grateful for the religious pluralism which enriches and ennobles our faith, we are inspired to deepen our understanding and expand our vision. As free congregations we enter into this covenant, promising to one another our mutual trust and support.
