Two annual awards will be presented at the UCE Annual General Meeting on May 5

The W.H. Alexander Award honours a person or persons for extraordinary services provided to benefit the church community.

The Charles Potter Award for Community Engagement honours a member of our congregation who has made an outstanding volunteer contribution to communities outside our church, and whose work there shows exceptional commitment to UU principles and values.

Submit your nominations for these awards by March 31 to board secretary Susan Ruttan by email – ruttans@shaw.ca – or in writing through the church office. If you want a list of past winners, email Susan.

Rules:

- Nominations must be made by UCE members and must include reasons for the nomination.
- Members of the board may not submit nominations.
- Staff members and members of the board are eligible for nomination, but not if they have served in their roles within the preceding year.
- There is no limit on the number of times a person may be nominated for, or win, the award.

She poured her heart and soul into UCE, serving as a board member, Religious Education helper, choir member, and virtually every other role imaginable (short of Board President!). Her positive energy was infectious, her commitment unwavering. She gave generously of her time, her talents, and her resources. Her absence leaves a void in our community that will be deeply felt.

Dorothy believed in UCE. She understood its value as a special place, a source of connection and growth. We all share that belief. We may not all be able to contribute at the same level as Dorothy, but we can all honor her legacy by supporting the community she loved.

Remembering Dorothy









A life centered around work, family, and church – on the surface sounds like a pretty typical pattern for those in the last century. But her relationship to this church was anything but surface.

If you've been around UCE long enough, you may have known her as Dot, but most of you knew her as Dorothy and as a fixture of the congregation for over six decades.

Born in Toronto on March 4, 1934, she was the eldest of four children. Her parents, Jarvis and Avis McCurdy, embraced Unitarianism, shaping her lifelong faith. She married Bernie at First Unitarian Toronto, and after moving to Edmonton in 1960, they raised four children, all involved in UCE.

A dedicated educator, Dorothy taught at the School for the Deaf before spending decades as a teacher and librarian at Rio Terrace Elementary. She and Bernie were active in various circles—ATA, NDP, bridge, bowling, curling, and community causes—but UCE remained central to their lives.

Dorothy served UCE in many roles, from board member to RE teacher, with her greatest passion being the Denominational Affairs Committee. She found spiritual renewal in the wider Unitarian movement, attending UUA and CUC gatherings.

And yet, UCE was home, the grounding, the anchor of their faith. UCE returned that honour and respect with awards like the W.H. Alexander award and the naming of Keeler Hall.

On February 18th, after a short two and a half days in Sturgeon Hospital, Dorothy's body gave way. Her children Glenn and Megan, and her grandchild Dee, were at her bedside. She was just short of 91.

Dorothy is gone. But we remain.


Important Notice Regarding Dorothy Keeler and Beth Jenkins





The Principles and Sources of our Religious Faith

UU congregations affirm and promote eight principles, which we hold as strong values and moral guides. As Rev. Barbara Wells ten Hove explains, "The principles are not dogma or doctrine, but rather a guide for those of us who choose to join and participate in UU religious communities."

Our Eight Principles

- The inherent worth and dignity of every person;
- Justice, equity, and compassion in human relations;
- Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations;
- A free and responsible search for truth and meaning;
- The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large;
- The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all;
- Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.
- Individual and communal action that accountably dismantles racism and systemic
- barriers to full inclusion in ourselves and our institutions

We live out these principles within a "living tradition" of wisdom and spirituality, drawn from such diverse sources as science, poetry, scripture, and personal experience.

Our Six Sources

- Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces which create and uphold life;
- Words and deeds of prophetic people which challenge us to confront powers and structures of evil with justice, compassion, and the transforming power of love;
- Wisdom from the world's religions which inspires us in our ethical and spiritual life;
- Jewish and Christian teachings which call us to respond to God's love by loving our neighbours as ourselves;
- Humanist teachings which counsel us to heed the guidance of reason and the results of science, and warn us against idolatries of the mind and spirit;
- Spiritual teachings of Earth-centred traditions which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature.
- Grateful for the religious pluralism which enriches and ennobles our faith, we are inspired to deepen our understanding and expand our vision. As free congregations we enter into this covenant, promising to one another our mutual trust and support.
