

Board Update

Your Board of Trustees held its annual planning retreat on September 14, following the Sunday service. Gathering in person was a real bonus, as most of our meetings are on Zoom. Sitting across the table from one another has a very different energy than looking across a screen of faces.

2025/26 Board Goals

The board's oversight of church finances and operations is guided by UCE's vision and mission, which helps to focus on goals and objectives. Reflecting on last year's achievements and challenges led to the decision to keep those goals, continuing to support and build on the successes of the Membership Team, Communications and Marketing Team, and Governance Advisory Team, as well as so many other volunteer groups. A fourth goal was added. The board goals for 2025/26 are:

- To enhance financial sustainability by supporting increased fundraising initiatives
- To advance membership growth by encouraging opportunities for engagement and hospitality
- To revitalize both internal and external communication and marketing of UCE's many positive attributes
- To begin work on medium- to long-term planning starting with a five-year horizon and annual milestones

Fundraisers

The first goal of increased fundraising has been given a kick start by Governance Advisory Team members Brandie Moller-Reid and Karen Mills, who have volunteered to organize a 50/50 raffle this fall. I have also heard that Chorealis will host another cabaret in the new year. You will hear more about both fundraisers, I'm sure.

It is essential that more fundraisers be undertaken to replace the revenue that the garage sale has provided for the past 20-some years. It is highly unlikely that a garage sale will be held in the spring as the energy and time required by organizers is becoming increasingly difficult to sustain.

So bring your enthusiasm and support to a vibrant UCE community!

Governance

You Talk. We listen.

Over the past months, we have engaged in consultations, both in survey form and in small groups to hear your ideas going forward with a revitalized UCE. At the end of June, there was a session called "From the Outside, Looking In," and we brainstormed around imagining UCE as a person.

Here is what we learned:

- Many propose changing the name "church" to a more community friendly name, like "Centre" for example. This is an action already been undertaken by several UU congregations. This concept will be explored further through ongoing research and continued dialogue.
- Enhancing the church's exterior has been a recurring suggestion, consistently highlighted in community feedback. While this idea is frequently raised, it carries significant budgetary considerations.
- You mentioned greeters could play a more impactful role and be more helpful to new visitors (think of tours, etc.) This has been passed to the Membership Team who are managing this.
- There were requests for an "elevator speech" to help describe who we are. This is in progress and you will hear more about this soon.
- There's been steady feedback encouraging more regular social gatherings at UCE. In response, we've planned potlucks and a Pancake Sunday to help bring people together. Westwood will receive a special invitation to join us. Be sure to check the newsletter for all the details.

From your feedback, four key qualities describing the UCE emerged: we are/aspire to be open-minded, loving. grounded and alive.

Thank you for your participation in requests for feedback which helps improve our two-way communication and build a stronger UCE into the long term.



Our Eight Principles

- The inherent worth and dignity of every person;
- Justice, equity, and compassion in human relations;
- Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations;
- A free and responsible search for truth and meaning;
- The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large;
- The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all;
- Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.
- Individual and communal action that accountably dismantles racism and systemic barriers to full inclusion in ourselves and our institutions.

Our Six Sources

- Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces which create and uphold life;
- Words and deeds of prophetic people which challenge us to confront powers and structures of evil with justice, compassion, and the transforming power of love;
- Wisdom from the world's religions which inspires us in our ethical and spiritual life;
- Jewish and Christian teachings which call us to respond to God's love by loving our neighbours as ourselves;
- Humanist teachings which counsel us to heed the guidance of reason and the results of science, and warn us against idolatries of the mind and spirit;
- Spiritual teachings of Earth-centred traditions which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature.
