A treaty is an inheritance, a responsibility and a relationship. May we be good neighbours to one another, good stewards to our planet and good ancestors to our children.



A river is a remarkable thing. It carves paths through stone, sustains ecosystems, and flows with a force that seems singular. Yet, if you trace that river back to its origins, you won't find one massive source - you will find thousands of tiny, individual streams. Some are rushing rapids; others are quiet trickles. The river needs all of them to reach the sea.

Our church operates the same way. UCE is self-supporting. We don't receive funding from a denomination; we are sustained solely by the streams of support from our members.

When we talk about pledging, it's easy to get caught up in the numbers. But the heart of this campaign isn't about the size of the gift - it's about the act of contribution.

It's about connection: Your pledge is your way of saying, "I am part of this flow."

It's about equity: We recognize that every stream has a different volume. What matters is that your "stream" joins the rest. Whether it is a rushing torrent or a steady drip, it adds to our collective depth.



Your annual pledge is what allows our programs to run, our choir to sing, and our doors to remain open as a sanctuary for liberal religious thought. As you reflect on your pledge this year, don't ask if your contribution is "enough" compared to others. Simply ask yourself: "Am I ready to add my stream to the river?"

It's a tough job....



You know the old saying, “It’s a tough job but somebody’s got to do it”. That’s the board’s role every year at this time when we must approve a proposed annual budget to take to the congregation at the AGM on the first Sunday in May. Thanks to our treasurer, Andrew Mills, and the Finance Committee of Ruth Merriott, David Rae, Brandie Moller-Reid and Tony Wong, there are realistic numbers to consider.

The expense part of the ledger is not the toughest part to compile because actual figures from this and past years are available for review. Some research will provide data for any anticipated changes. The harder part is giving a reasonable projection of the revenue we can expect – or “hope for” might be the more apt term. That’s where pledges of monetary support from members and friends come into the picture.

Periodic, often unexpected, donations are wonderful to receive and much appreciated. Annual pledges, however, signal a commitment by members and friends to financially support our spiritual community for the entire year. It gives the board a more solid footing to build on. Pledges indicate an intentionality, an understanding of what this community means to them, and how they might feel if it wasn’t around anymore.

Of course, pledge amounts vary depending on varying life circumstances. Many people use preauthorized deposits as part of their monthly budgeting considerations. Those regular amounts also help with our cash flow predictions. Other options to fulfill your pledge can be found on the UCE website, through links in the Friday emails, and in paper forms at the church.

So, I ask you to submit a pledge form before the end of March to help make the board’s job a bit easier. Thank you for your belief in the value of our UCE home.

Two annual awards will be presented at the UCE annual general meeting on May 3:

The Charles Potter Award for Community Engagement honours a member of our congregation who has made an outstanding volunteer contribution to communities outside our church, and whose work there shows exceptional commitment to UU principles and values.

Submit your nominations for these awards by March 31 to board secretary Susan Ruttan by email – ruttans@shaw.ca – or in writing through the church office. If you want a list of past winners, email Susan.

Rules:

- Nominations must be made by UCE members and must include reasons for the nomination.
- Members of the board may not submit nominations.
- People who have been staff members or members of the board within the preceding year are not eligible to receive the award.
- Past staff members and members of the board are eligible if the services for which they are recommended were not performed during the period when they held these special positions.
- There is no limit on the number of times a person may be nominated for, or win, the award.



UU congregations affirm and promote eight principles, which we hold as strong values and moral guides. As Rev. Barbara Wells ten Hove explains, “The principles are not dogma or doctrine, but rather a guide for those of us who choose to join and participate in UU religious communities.”

Our Eight Principles

- The inherent worth and dignity of every person;
- Justice, equity, and compassion in human relations;
- Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations;
- A free and responsible search for truth and meaning;
- The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large;
- The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all;
- Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.
- Individual and communal action that accountably dismantles racism and systemic barriers to full inclusion in ourselves and our institutions.

Our Six Sources

- Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces which create and uphold life;
- Words and deeds of prophetic people which challenge us to confront powers and structures of evil with justice, compassion, and the transforming power of love;
- Wisdom from the world’s religions which inspires us in our ethical and spiritual life;
- Jewish and Christian teachings which call us to respond to God’s love by loving our neighbours as ourselves;
- Humanist teachings which counsel us to heed the guidance of reason and the results of science, and warn us against idolatries of the mind and spirit;
- Spiritual teachings of Earth-centred traditions which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature.
