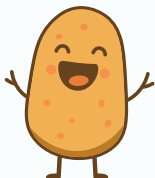

President's Ponderings: Testing Our Resilience

Well folks, this has been quite the summer for UCE. The broken water main has been a source of much work and worry for many – Open Doors Learning Centre, UCE's board, maintenance team, and most particularly for Andrew Mills, our volunteer property manager. You'll read more about the flood restoration in this newsletter.

I could sprinkle some puns about dampening our plans or how the situation is very fluid – but frankly the situation calls for a drier tone. The repairs to the water line and water-damaged parts of the building are significant and will require patience and support of the whole congregation. The weeks ahead will test our resilience, resolve and flexibility.

This crisis comes at a time when we already face a lengthy search for a new minister. That process is well in hand as you'll read in this newsletter. But it does mean additional work for the Worship, Arts and Music Team; Pastoral Care Team; Board of Trustees; our church administrator; and others who may be called upon to help.

So, this is a really good time to reflect on what UCE means to each of us, and how strongly we are connected in spirit and purpose.

Our Vision: We open doors to all seekers of spiritual growth and nurture positive change for a just and healthy world.

That's big work. We do hold each other in community – but there are so many others in this city who are searching for a spiritual home, where they are welcomed with open hearts, where dogma and discrimination do not enter what should be a place of sanctuary. Now, more than ever, when fear mongering and division are growing, that sanctuary is needed. And the building provides that space to gather in our own fellowship but also to support many community needs on a regular basis – Food Bank, AA groups, Dragging Youth, AWARE education programming, several choirs – and others more intermittently.

A new website will soon be launched providing a fresh platform to promote our strengths and commitment. We have much to look forward to.

Hey, I think I'm ready for a pun now. Our church is undergoing a sea change, but we are awash with goodwill and overflowing with fellowship. Welcome back to a new year at UCE.

UCE After the Flood: Progress and Plans

On Thursday, August 6th just before 7 pm, one of our AA groups reported water running into the church. Our main water line had burst underground and was pouring into the Open Doors SE building. It filled that building 2” deep and then ran under the door to start flooding the church.

By the time we got the water shut off at about 9 pm, the church offices, library, lobby, sanctuary, Keeler Hall, and kitchen had flooded. We called Belfor Restoration and they were there at 10 pm and worked through the night to get the water cleaned up and dehumidifiers and fans put in place (hooray and thank you!!). We called our insurer the next morning and confirmed we have sufficient coverage to repair this water damage (with some exceptions).

Belfor has been doing a great job; they cleaned up the water quickly and by Aug 15th had emptied all our spaces and removed carpets and sections of drywall to get everything dried out. Once the emergency cleanup is done, they will prepare an estimate that our insurance will use to sort out our damage claim. Then repairs can begin.

As of now, the church is closed. Our immediate problem is to repair the water line. We have chosen a contractor, and they will begin on Sept. 9. In the meantime, Epcor has provided an emergency water supply. This supply allows us to use some of our spaces (even if under construction) and means Open Doors can resume the use of two of their three spaces.

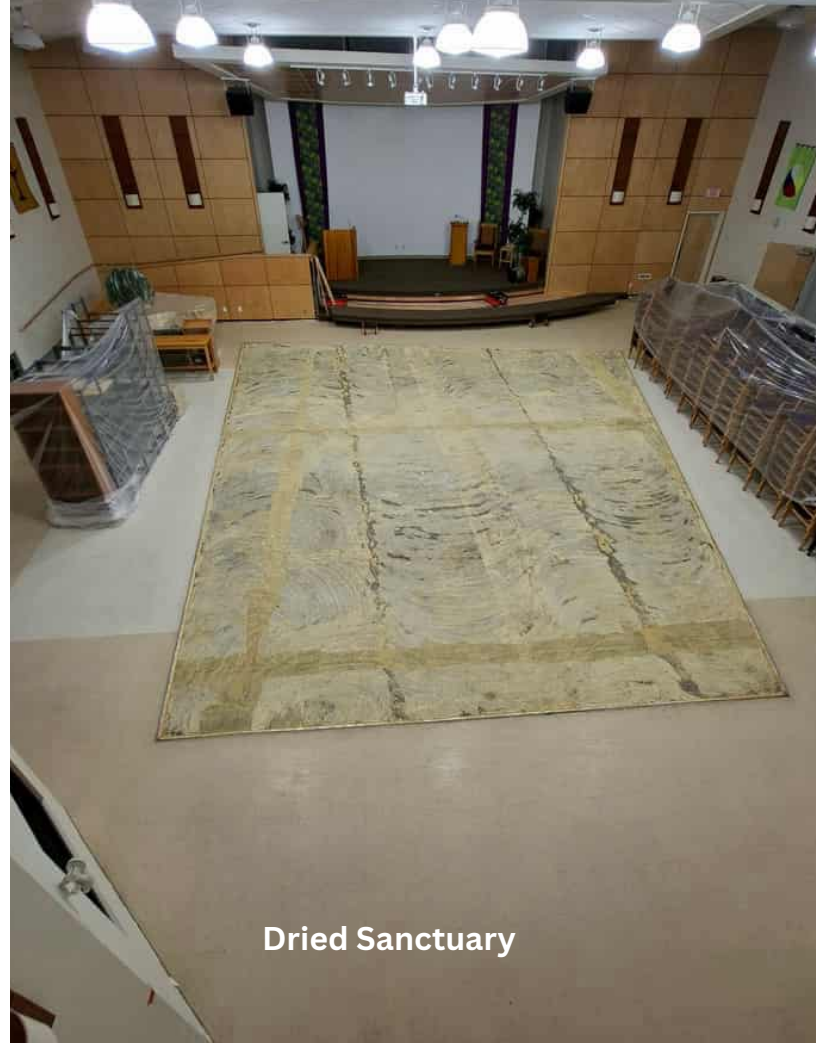
Donations needed

I ask that you consider giving an additional donation to our Reserve Fund to help us offset some of the upcoming costs and the loss of some of our rental income. For example, the repair of the water line is not covered and will likely cost more than \$20,000. We currently have only \$31,934 in our reserve fund. Donations can be made by Interac to chadmin@uce.ca, or online through Canada Helps, and we will have donation envelopes available at the church.

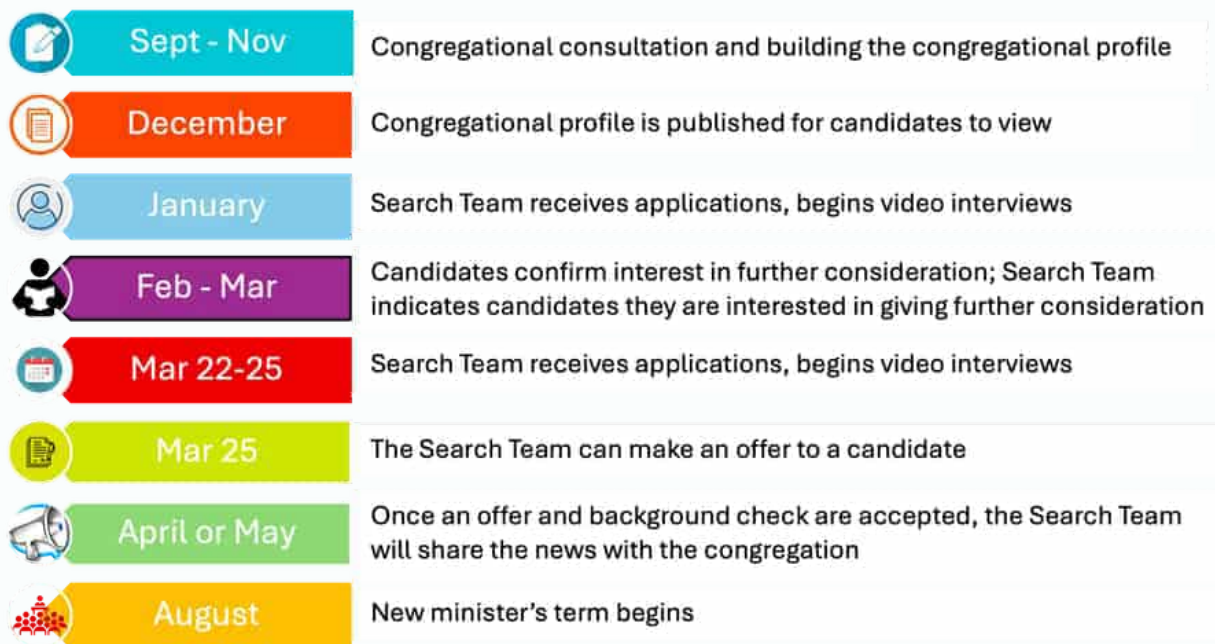
Ministerial Search Update

In Honour of Starr Curry and Her Bequest to the Endowment Fund



A memorial service was held at UCE in June 2025, to remember Starr Curry, a long-time UCE member, who passed away the previous month.

Although ill health had kept her from being a familiar face in recent years, Starr had a deep dedication to her community and a long connection with UCE. A member for four decades, she was active earlier at UCE, serving on the children's program committee in the early 1990s, although she did not have children herself. From December 1995 to mid-1997, she was on the Ministerial Search Committee to find a new minister after Rev. John Marsh's tenure.

Professionally she held a Master's in Social Work from Dalhousie University. Starr served as an instructor at Norquest College and Portage College and social worker during her career. In her personal life, she chose the path of caregiving and actively maintaining connections with family members.

Some UCE members will remember Starr most vividly through her activities with the Alberta NDP. As one tribute at her service said:

Alberta's New Democrats remember Starr Curry for her dedication to social justice and the party. ... Starr was a founding member of the Alberta NDP Women's Caucus and helped to create the Olga Blondheim Fund, now known as the Blondheim Babcock fund, which raises money to support Women running as candidates.

"Starr's life and work was defined by lifting up others: her students, her party, and in particular, the lives of women. She was also a caregiver for her family."

One further example of Starr's dedication to others: she included UCE in her will. UCE gratefully acknowledges receiving Starr's bequest to the Endowment Fund in July of this year. Her legacy lives on along with her UU principles.

Remembering the Rev. Fred Cappuccino

The Canadian Unitarian Council (CUC) sent out the following message:

Dear friends,

We are saddened to share the death of the Rev. Fred Cappuccino, who died at the age of 100 after an extraordinary life of ministry, service, courage, and love.

Fred's life was deeply woven into Canadian Unitarian Universalism. He served congregations including Lakeshore Unitarian Universalist Congregation and was Founding Minister Emeritus of the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Ottawa, where he led the fellowship's inaugural service in 1996. Just this January, UUFO gathered to celebrate Fred's 100th birthday alongside the fellowship's 30th anniversary.



But Fred's ministry extended far beyond the walls of any congregation.

For Fred, faith was something to be lived. In 1965, he joined hundreds of clergy who travelled to Selma, Alabama, to stand with those struggling for racial justice. With his wife, Bonnie, he raised a family of 21 children, 19 of whom were adopted from countries around the world. Together, Fred and Bonnie founded Child Haven International in 1985, creating communities of care for children and women in India, Nepal, Tibet, and Bangladesh.

Over a century of life, Fred showed what it can mean to put our values into practice: to meet suffering with compassion, injustice with courage, and human need with generosity and action.

He received many honours, including the Order of Canada and recognition from UNESCO for teaching human rights. Yet the greater measure of his life can be found in the people, families, congregations, and communities shaped by his care.

Fred leaves Canadian Unitarian Universalists a remarkable legacy. We give thanks for his ministry, for the example of his life, and for the many ways his spirit will continue through those he inspired.

We hold Bonnie, Fred's family, the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Ottawa, the Child Haven International community, and all who knew and loved him in our hearts.

A fuller obituary celebrating Fred's life will follow.

- Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations;
- A free and responsible search for truth and meaning;
- The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large;
- The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all;
- Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.
- Individual and communal action that accountably dismantles racism and systemic barriers to full inclusion in ourselves and our institutions.

Our Six Sources

- Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces which create and uphold life;
- Words and deeds of prophetic people which challenge us to confront powers and structures of evil with justice, compassion, and the transforming power of love;
- Wisdom from the world’s religions which inspires us in our ethical and spiritual life;
- Jewish and Christian teachings which call us to respond to God’s love by loving our neighbours as ourselves;
- Humanist teachings which counsel us to heed the guidance of reason and the results of science, and warn us against idolatries of the mind and spirit;
- Spiritual teachings of Earth-centred traditions which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature.
